

"Student Power" has become the key phrase in the United States and around the world over the past few years. Student power has been a principle factor in such movements as the civil rights struggle and the anti-Vietnam question and the term is again coming to the forefront as students across the nation become thoroughly immersed in campaign '68. Students are following their candidates from state to state, city to city and door to door. It is not only the power being exerted that makes the world take notice of the students but it is also their sheer numbers. The facts are that the youth, those under 25, will soon be in the majority of the world's population. And the majority of these people, at least in this nation, are, or will be, students.

From the students' viewpoint this rise of student power is a great breakthrough. The students feel the world finally has a chance. As they become "educated", intellectually endowed and more knowledgeable, they see the only way for the world to go is up - led by them. I, too, feel student power can be a positive influence on the destiny of the nation and the world, but I also feel that if not wielded responsibly, student power can prove quite detrimental.

It is in this light that I cast a more than skeptical eye to the role of the students in campaign '68. Yes, it should be the students that are to take the lead, to set the example in responsibly choosing and backing their candidates, but will they? Or will the students decline into another potential voting block, such as labor or industry, to be swayed and blown by the gusty wind of politics? Will all the rationality and education that they have learned lose out to emotion or to conformity or bias or prejudice? Will they too become a part of the impressionable masses in choosing their candidates? The plea is that they will not. A plea that they will choose responsibly, intelligently, and that in doing so, they will set the example for the rest of the nation. That is the plea, but will it be heard above the shouts and screams of this political year.

Spring sports have come back into the news at Marian as the tennis, golf, and track teams swung into action within the past week. Action shifts into high gear next week, however, as the baseball squad also opens its season in rousing fashion.

John Harkins' diamondmen open with double-headers on Sat. and Sun. at Rose Poly and Bellarmine respectively. Then the Knights return to action on April 13 with a twin bill with Wabash on the lakeside diamond. Following the Wabash tilts are a date with Aquinas of Michigan on April 15, a twin bill with Hanover on April 18, a return engagement with Aquinas on April 19 and an April 23 contest with Depauw. All these tilts will be on the diamond below the library.

Tennis

Coach Vilis Donis' tennis team opened their season Tuesday last with a heartbreaking setback at the hands of Southern Kentucky by a 4-3 count. Dan Eha picked up where he left off last year as M.C.'s big winner by beating his man 6-1, 6-0. Steve Stafford proved a pleasant surprise as he defeated his opponent 6-4, 7-5.

The Marian racketmen return to action Sat. as they entertain Bellarmine and follow up with a Tuesday engagement with Wabash, also on the home courts. The week after Easter break pits Marian against city rivals Indiana Central on April 23 and Butler on April 26. The I.C. match is a home tilt while Butler will be the host in their match.

Golf

Fr. Pat Smith's golfers got their season off to a fine start as they won their first two starts of the season, without the services of Larry Schmalz and Bob Hammerle. Host Southern Kentucky fell to Marian's duffers by a 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ -9 $\frac{1}{2}$ count while Hanover was the second victim by an 8-7 count. Mike Komlanc was the medalist in each match as he carded 81's both trips.

The golf team will be idle now until the return from the spring break, when they take on Butler and Wabash in a triangular match at Coffin on April 25, followed by another home match with Earlham.

Track

The track team opened its season last weekend with an appearance in the Indiana State Open at Terre Haute. Roger Lyons, running against strong winds and formidable opposition, was clocked at 10.3 in the 100 yard dash. The 440 relay team of Lyons, Larry Turner, Randy Stahley and Brett Willoughby lowered its school record, set only last year, by turning in a 45.3 clocking.

The wingfeet return to action April 13 when they participate in the Wabash Relays in Crawfordsville. Then the Bridges Brigade lay off until after the spring break, when they run at Indiana Central.

SETTING THINGS STRAIGHT

Q. When will there again be a full-time counselor on campus?
 A. "We hope to have a full-time Director of Counseling and Guidance on campus next year. This person would take care of freshmen orientation and their testing and counseling program; he would devote time also to counseling other students. In addition, the director of Indiana University's NDEA Counseling and Guidance Institute, Dr. Kurpius, has agreed to supervise three intern counselors on our campus. At the present time, we are concerned that too few students are using the counseling services provided by the counselors coming to campus several days a week. Any student who wishes an appointment to discuss career plans, academic achievement, social or personal problems, may stop by Student Services to make an appointment at a time convenient to them."--Mr. Fields

Q. Why are there no adequate medical facilities and aid for the students here at the college?
 A. "Any student who wishes medical attention is free to choose the doctor and the type of services desired. The respective residence directors can furnish names of doctors or dentists if students desire that information. Provision has been made on campus for first aid. A call to the Marian College Information Office will get quick attention. The information about first aid is also on the official bulletin board.

Although it is felt that an extensive, elaborate health service is not necessary nor economically feasible where excellent medical facilities are as accessible as they are in the Indianapolis area, a proposal for a part-time nurse on campus next year has been submitted by Sr. Miriam Clare, O.S.F., Sr. Constance, D.C. and Student Services. This arrangement would make the services of a registered nurse on campus available about three hours a day in the medical suite of Clare Hall; all students would be free to make use of the health center. The health center's usefulness would be evaluated at the end of the next school year and a decision made at that time regarding its usefulness in future years."--Mr. Fields
