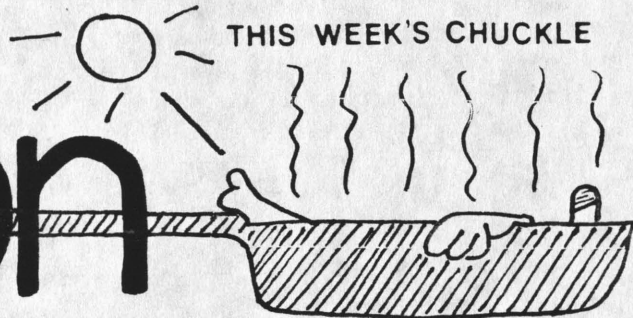

New Long Distance Billing

In July 1985, Indiana Bell Telephone will no longer permit colleges and universities to use the student billing number system for personal telephone calls. The college is required to either cancel long distance service, implement its own billing system or require that students obtain Indiana Bell Telephone Calling (credit) cards. Rather than cancel long distance service, Marian chose to require all students who desire long distance service to have a Indiana Bell Calling card.

As a student, you may secure a Calling Card in one of the following three ways:

1. You may use your home telephone calling card and have long distance calls made from your college number billed to your home telephone number.
2. You may contact Indiana Bell and apply for you own Calling card.
3. You may wait until fall registration. At that time a representative from Indiana Bell will be present on campus to process your application for a Calling card.

I wish to emphasize that this change in policy is not caused by any arbitrary ruling on the part of the College. It is required because of a change in operating procedure by Indiana Bell Telephone and will apply to all colleges and universities in the state.
