How many of you fellow students have become aware of the triple ring occurring on our phones? Well, after talking with Rich Rosenfeld, I now know how the system works, and I'm very impressed.

I'm sure you can all relate with the constantly busy phones, accompanied by hours and hours of pushing those two numbers, (88), just to get an outside line. Well, now due to a new addition to our phone system, we no longer have to worry about getting an outside line. Those three spurts of tone you occasionally hear when trying to get an outside line, is what is commonly known in the phone business, as QUEUING.

When all the "outside line" trunks are full, this is when "queuing" will occur. When you hear the 3 short spurts of tone, you will know your line has been "queued," or to put it into English, the next available outside line has been reserved for you. Now, you just wait for an open line.

According to Rich, there are two ways in which "queuing" will work:

Step 1. When you have heard the tones, immediately hang up your phone, and wait until you hear the triple ring. Then pick up your phone, and dial the desired phone number.

Step 2. After the tones, dial the desired phone number, (note-this will only work for local calls), then hang up your phone. When you've heard the triple ring, pick up your phone, and your desired number will have already been dialed.

The way "queuing" works is this. Once you know your line has been confirmed, (the 3 tones), then when an open line is ready, a computer recalls your number, and then automatically redials the desired number you want. There's only one catch, though. If you pick up your phone anytime while you are waiting for the triple ring, you will cancel your call holding, and you will have to start all over again. So be careful!

"Queuing" has definitely turned out to be a great addition to the phone system here on campus. I don't know about you, but it has certainly spared me my sanity from the annoying busy lines.

The mens and womens basketball teams wrapped up their regular season play last week. Both teams finished with winning seasons. The womens final record was 16-8 while the mens was 15-12. Congratulations to both teams and coaches!

On Wednesday, February 20, the women hosted DePauw and defeated them 80-74 for the second time this season. Leading scorers for the Knights were Julie Wilhoit with 18 points followed by Jennice Chaney with 13. Kim Zeronik was the leading rebounder with 12 while Chaney had 9. Kim Hattom contributed 6 valuable assists to help in the Knight Victory.

On Thursday, February 21, women travelled to Anderson for a make-up game and returned a winner 71-61. Diane Ciciora was the leading scorer for the Knights with 16 points while Julie Wilhoit had 13. Jennice Chaney was the leading rebounder with 11 boards followed by Ciciora with 9. DeEtta Million added 7 assists to give the Knights their 15th win.

The women put another mark in the win column by defeating Mt. St. Joseph 64-60 in overtime on Saturday February 23. The Knights were led in scoring by Julie Wilhoit with 24 points and Diane Ciciora with 14. Kim Zeronik, Liz Gilmore, and Ciciora were the leading rebounders with 7 each. Janis Blome had 5 assists for the Knights while Zeronik had 6 defensive steals.

The men travelled to Franklin, February 20 to get revenge on their previous season loss to Franklin, but again the Knights were defeated 85-76. Dave Mahurin was the Knights leading scorer with 18 points followed by Ron Wituski and Dave Back with 12 each. Mahurin also led in rebounding with 7 boards while Back had 6.

On Saturday, February 23, the men hosted Indiana Tech and won easily 82-66 over the Warriors. Dave Mahurin led the Knights in scoring with 23 points and in rebounding with 8. Darren Fish added 17 points and Dave Back grabbed 7 rebounds. Mike McKenzie contributed 6 assists and 6 steals for the Knights.

In NAIA district play, both Marian teams played excellent and were victorious.

The women, ranked fourth in the tournament, met fifth ranked Oakland City and displayed very aggressive and competitive play. Julie Wilhoit lead the scoring for the Knights with 21 points in the 83-67 win. Liz Gilmore and Carla Bessler added 11 points

each. Wilhoit was also the leading rebounder with 8 followed by Kim Zeronik with 7. Kim Hattom contributed 6 assists and 4 steals in the big victory.


The women travel to IUPUI, who is first ranked in the tourney, Thursday, February 28. If the Knights are victorious, they will play in the championship game Saturday, March 2.


