

Drama, Music In Observance Of Nativity

Focal point of the Christmas assembly, Dec. 17, was the dramatic-choral presentation of the Nativity. The distinction of Christmas Madonna, traditionally conferred on a senior by choice of a faculty committee, was given to Maryann Beckerich, Indianapolis.

With Kathleen Bashe, Terre Haute, as attending angel, the Madonna portrayed in pantomime the familiar incidents of the Christmas story, as the student body climaxed a carol series with *Silent Night*. Accompanied by a seven-piece woodwind ensemble, the series began with *Joy to the World* and included five other sacred carols.

Can there be peace for them, for us? We look at the Child in the manger and reflect confidently that He is the Prince of Peace. We raise our eyes to His Mother Mary and know that as she gave Jesus and His Peace to the world at Bethlehem, she is eager to do so for our time again. She has told us that if we will pray and do penance she will give us Peace once more. Let us do so now, in our college life, in this Advent, in this Christmas season, in this Marian Year.

In his beautiful encyclical for the Marian year our Holy Father urges us to heed her injunction. He prays that she may unite all men in friendly agreement,

For then only can they enjoy whatever peaceful prosperity may be given to us during the course of this mortal life . . . when, joining hands in friendly affect, they exchange the kiss of peace . . . which, guided by justice and nurtured by charity, unites in one harmonious family the various classes of citizens, nations and people."

Here, indeed, is the peace we are seeking—peace on earth, the Prince of Peace in our hearts, brought to us as always—through Mary.

Michigan Publishes Sister's New Book

The Sources of Hojeda's La Cristiada by Sister Mary Edgar, professor of modern languages, has been published by the University of Michigan as Volume XXVI in its Language and Literature series.

La Cristiada by Fray Diego de Hojeda, O.P., is one of the great religious epics of the 17th century. The epic covers the events in the life of Christ from the Last Supper to the burial of our Lord. It summarizes the complex and ornate type of learning and culture that predominated during the golden age of Spain.

Sister's purpose in writing the book was to point out the political system and culture of Spain during this time and to explain to what extent *La Cristiada* is a reflection and an interpretation of the culture of this age. It is a scientific study which has required years of research.
