LATE REGISTRATION AND SCHEDULE CHANGES

Late Registration — January 14 - 21. The last day to register for any class in the regular spring program is Wednesday the 21st. Late registration fee is \$5.

Add Courses — students in the spring program may add courses according to the following provisions:

1. Approval of advisor is required.
2. Approval of instructor is required if the class is limited or has been 'closed.'
3. Approval of the Dean of Academic Affairs is required if the new schedule totals 18 hours or more.
4. A course must be added on or before the 21st which marks the end of the first full week of classes.

Withdrawal — A student may drop a class by filing the designated form with the Registrar. If a class is dropped before January 21st, no grade will be recorded. If a class is dropped after that date and before February 17th, a 'W' is recorded and the student will be charged a \$5 schedule-change fee.

Change of status — A student may change a class from pass/fail to grade or vice versa anytime before February 17th. Between January 22 and February 17 a \$5 schedule-change fee will be charged.

New students from out of town will need a student billing number. Please see Sr. Rose Marie in the Business Office as soon as possible.

LIFE IN SPAIN

Each year for 5 weeks of the summer, a program is offered to students of the U.S. and Canada to travel and study in Spain. Last summer 93 students from 25 states, Canada and Puerto Rico departed from Kennedy Airport and flew to Madrid. The group was then bussed to the campus of the Ciudad Universitaria of Madrid where they lived and attended classes. The living quarters consisted of one room per student. Each class met five days a week and courses ranged from Elementary Spanish to Literature and Culture. Students toured La Mancha for two days, visiting all the interesting places related to Cervantes and Don Quixote. Sixty students made a four day tour to Santiago de Compostela and Leon.

Once or twice a week a group was scheduled to visit such historical places as Valle de los Caidos, El Escorial, Segovia, Avila, Toledo, Museo del Prado, Palacio Real etc.

Students found that they also had more than enough time to do, see, and learn whatever they chose.

As part of the program, a trip was taken to southern Spain, visiting famous cities as Cordoba, Sevilla, Granada, Malaga, and two days were spent in the beautiful Torremolinos Beach.

Plans are already in progress for the 17th Summer School Program in Spain 1981. Students may earn 9 quarter college credits.
