

## SPORTS

With the second week of intramural football action completed three teams are still undefeated. At the top of the pile in League # 1 are Herm's A Worm and The Miracles both at 2-0. In League # 2 the Gods of Hellfire stand alone in first place also at 2-0.

Last Sunday's competition began with the game which most of the crowd had turned out to watch - the Gods of Hellfire-Guzz Bombs tilt. The two teams played evenly the first ten minutes with both scoring on two touch-down passes apiece. But then with the score knotted at 12-all, Mike Govert of the Gods hit his end Larry Unser on a 37 yrd. touchdown pass and the Gods were never headed the rest of the way. The Guzz Bombs sparked briefly in the second half when Haire hit Hasty on 45 yd. scoring jaunt. But the Gods tallied quickly on passes to Danno and Wiseman and the final score read Gods 45 - Guzz Bombs 18.

In the second game, the Gods may have received some help in their quest for a league championship as the only other undefeated team, Degenerates II, was knocked off by the Wild Bunch 16-0. The Wild Bunch's first score came on a run by Terry Smith which would have done Gayle Sayers proud as ripped off 36 yds enroute to paydirt. Then late in the first half, Ken Tyrrell hit Tony Fornuto for a 55yd. scoring pass. Much credit must be given to the defensive efforts of Paul Broxterman and Dale Hemmelgarn whose pass rush kept the pressure on the Degenerates II quarterback most of the game. Furthermore, Mike Mills intercepted a pass to kill a Degenerate II drive and Terry Smith provided excellent punt coverage to account for a safety for the Wild Bunch.

Just For Kicks picked up their first win as Frizzled Chicken forfeited their second game. The Miracles continued their winning ways by defeating the Vice Lord 13-0. Dan Hayden figured in both touchdowns, throwing for one to Dan Scanlon and receiving a touchdown pass from Tim Ellinger.

In the last game, Herm's a Worm also picked up their second win against no losses as they defeated the Mother Truckers 20-0. This marks the second consecutive game that Herm's A Worm has kept its opponents from scoring.

In last week's fearless forecast, I went four for five. I'll try to do better this time. The Miracles and Just For Kicks may be the most evenly matched game. If the Kicks get over injuries to Tom Hanrahan and ace receiver Tom Zackowitz, they should take it. Otherwise, the Miracles will take the victory. The Gods of Hellfire will win over the Intramural Football Team. Herm's A Worm will defeat Frizzled Chicken. Vice Lord and Mother Truckers are also well-matched but the Vice Lord will triumph. The last game pits Degenerates II against the Guzz Bombs. The Guzz Bombs have more scoring potential but may have trouble on defense. I'll still take the Guzz Bombs by a narrow margin.

## STUDENT BOARD REPORT

The Student Board meeting of Sunday, Oct. 4, 1970 proceeded as follows:

Committee Reports were given beginning with the treasurer's which totaled \$1796.64.

Clare Hall Representative Nancy Perkins reported that Little Sis weekend will be Oct. 23-25. Dean Brames met with the Board and the seniors or otherwise 21 year olds to discuss the no hour's system this week. It was decided to work out the details of the new system.

Soph. class rep., Ed McCord, reported that the problem with the absent band for Marian's first mixer has been solved. The band's sponsor offered The Fifth Column at a reduced rate. The dance will be this Saturday, Oct. 10.

For Academic Affairs, Mimi Meyer stated that a faculty-student committee will draw up the teacher course evaluation forms. A special program allowing students to test out of certain courses and still receive credit for them is being studied. This year's honor program is on a grade basis again. A proposal will be placed before the Faculty Council concerning November elections requesting that students be free of test Mon. and Wed. of that week. They further requested that the participating students not be held responsible for those classes if they made up the work missed.

Student Services rep., Joan Bailey, reported that Sr. Marie Pierre was appointed secretary of that group. All meetings will be held at 3:30 on the first and third Wednesday of the month and will be open to the general public. On the agenda for the second meeting will be revision of the Faculty Council Constitution, the Appeals Board, and the possibility of Greek organizations on campus.

Doyle Hall rep., Pat Oliver, reported that the housing contract was changed and the searching clause made clear.

President, Jim Herbe, reported that he, Mr. Faust, and Sister Patrick were chosen as members of the interim Appeals Committee.

Following the committee reports the previous week's business of committee appointments were discussed. Jane Peck was nominated for Religious Affairs. The first choices for Education were Sharon Stark and Cathy Andre. Mary Schulz was appointed by the Board to the Library Committee. For Buildings and Grounds
