EDITORIAL:

After consulting the bulletin board and the treasurer's budget for the 1961-62 school year, we see that the Student Board is left with a \$2,700 balance. This amount, together with a \$1,000 remaining from last year, should boost the total excess money to nearly \$4,000 by the end of the year.

Far be it from our policy to attempt to bully the Student Board, but we have a few suggestions as to how we feel some of this money could be spent. Having gathered together some ideas for improvements, we propose the following additions and alterations to the campus.

1) A change in the location of the campus flagpole and the purchase of a flag for it. Are you aware that there is a flagpole on campus? If not, don't feel bad about it; your fellow students aren't either. We do, however, have a flagpole. It is situated in front of the carport by the library. But there are several large trees hiding it, so that it is visible from only one position, when one stands beneath it and looks up. We suggest that it be moved to the northwest corner of the circle in front of the administration building, where it can be more plainly seen, and where our flag can be flown on National Holidays. By the way, Tudor Hall and Park School fly their colors daily.

2) The Purchase of a ping-pong table for the mixed lounge. There are only three recreation spots on the campus - the gymnasium, the tennis courts and the baseball diamond. One can play cards in the lounge, but what if a student doesn't play cards, tennis, basketball or baseball?

We feel that a sturdy ping-pong table and paddles would be a welcome addition.

3) Lights for the two large brick columns at the Marian College entrance. The rest of the driveway is well lighted, but the entrance is difficult to see at night when approaching in a car.

4) Investigation of the possibility of turning the peninsula of land down by the lake into a recreation area. Benches and tables would permit not only picnics, but studying and relaxation as well. A few interested students and faculty members began clearing the area last spring, but the idea seems to have bogged down. And why not a couple of boats for the lake?

STATISTICS* OF INTEREST TO YOU

Here are a few statistics which should interest the students of Marian:

Looking at the scholastic records of the 66 seniors who graduated in the Class of '61, we find that one-third of them had high school grade averages that ranked among the 5 highest. The second third had averages that ranked among the 10 highest of their hi-school graduating class.

The success of many of our students after they have graduated also attests to the scholastic merit of the school as well. Of the 67 lay graduates in the Class of '59, 18 have gone to graduate school. As of October, 1961, 8 of the 18 have a Masters Degree; of those, one has received his degree from The U. of Florida, one from Harvard, one from the U. of Illinois, and two from Fordham. One of the two at Fordham is going on for his Doctor Degree. Five more of the 11 are attending Catholic U., Washington D.C.; Indiana U., and Butler U.

There's a few records to shoot for, Freshmen!
