Editorial: Conduct Appeals.

A petition from nine faculty members was presented to Faculty Council yesterday to reconsider the Conduct Appeals procedure. The proposal submitted with this petition asked that in some cases the recommendations of the Appeals Committee be sent to the President for final decision rather than to the Dean of Student Services. More signatures on the student petition were also presented bringing up the total to 385 (including over three fourth of the Student Board). This petition was also concerned with having the final decision either rest in the committee or with the President.

Jim Herbe was kind enough to point out that the students really weren't informed and therefore that he doubted the petition's worth. Dean Branes backed this up by saying

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how easy it is to get students to sign petitions they know nothing about. How are students suppose to express their opinions if their petitions mean nothing?

Another argument against the new proposal was that appeals should be solved at the lower level. But isn't the very nature of an appeals to seek reconsideration at a higher level? Why isn't this same rationale, to solve problems at the lower level, applied to other things, such as Guest Hours Policy?

The new proposal failed 10 - 5. The committee's recommendations will be returned to the Dean, and he promises they will be given every consideration. Does anybody want to sit on it?

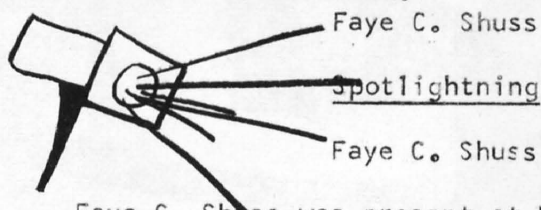
### Roshomon Review
