Annual Awards Program____

On Sunday, April 29, 1984, the College will host the Eighth Annual Student Recognition Program. The comprehensive awards program honors Marian College students who have excelled in three (3) major categories of student life: academic achievement; extracurricular activities; and varsity athletics. The awards program will be held at 2 PM in the Marian Hall Auditorium and will be followed by a reception for award recipients, parents and guests in the Allison Mansion. The program at 2 PM is open to the entire College Community and all Marian students, faculty and staff are encouraged to attend.

Dr. Louis C. Gatto, President of Marian College traditionally presides over the presentation of awards, assisted by Sr. Margaretta Black, Dean of Ácademic Affairs, Dr. Bill Woodman, Dean of Student Services and Mr. John Grimes, Director of Athletics. Father Frank Bryan, College Chaplain, departmental chairpersons, faculty and staff advisors to student clubs and organizations, athletic coaches and the Marian College Alumni Association President also play key roles in the program. The program features a keynote speaker, selected by the Student Affairs Committee, who is wellknown in the Marian College and Indianapolis community. This year, State Representative John Day, who represents District 45 This year, State Represented in the Indiana General Assembly, will be the featured speaker at the awards program. Rep. Day is a 1963 graduate of Marian College and he has served in the General Assembly since 1974. In 1978, Mr. Day was named recipient of the Marian College Alumni Association's Distinguished Alumnus Award.

A highlight of the program is the presentation of the Alumni Association Distinguished Senior Award. This award, which has been conferred annually since 1982, is the highest award for student leadership, achievement and service to Marian College. A permanent plaque commemorating each annual award winner by name and year appears in main foyer of Marian Hall.

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In most cases, selection for the awards is competitive and requires that each nominee to fulfill specific award criteria. Award nominations are made in early March by departmental chairpersons and faculty, student club/organization advisors and athletic coaches. The closing date for nominations is Friday, March 23. A listing of all available awards for 1983-84 appears on the main bulletin board, 1st floor, Marian Hall. Specific eligibility criteria for each award is available from the Student Services Office, Student Board Activities Office and from the individual academic department, club or athletic team.

Nutrition Week-

Often the question of what good nutrition is, is asked of today's society. It is the goal of this year's Home Ec. Club to make you more aware of what is good nutrition.

This year Nutrition Week will be celebrated March 26th 30th. The Home Ec. Club will take the no-nonsense approach to good nutrition. In the cafeteria, we will post the calorie composition of food served, display table tents with a question/answer format pertaining to nutrition and have an electronic quiz board available for your use. Watch for posters that will inform you of Nutrition Week activities.

Nutrition is a process in which the body converts foods into energy, and is a major determinant of good health. The key to good nutrition and health is to eat

a variety of foods that provide calories, fat, protein, carbohydrates, vitamins and minerals and to drink plenty of water.

Calories are a measure of the energy value of food. Caloric needs depends on how big you are and how active you are. The more active you are, the more calories you need daily to stay at the same body weight. If the calories eaten are less than the calories used by the body, then you will lose weight. Regardless of the food source, protein has four calories/ gram, carbohydrates have four calories/ gram, alcohol has seven calories/gram and fat has nine calories/gram.

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

While We're Gone

I'm writing this letter not to cry to people about my problems, but to make sure that the residents of Marian College are aware of a problem on campus that not only has affected my life but possibly the lives of others.

- FACT: On Thursday March 15, my roommate and I discovered \$90.00 missing from a dresser in our room.
- FACT: On Friday March 16 my roommate and I discovered another \$50.00 missing from the same dresser.
- FACT: The \$140.00 was taken between 10:00 am. and 1:30 pm. on Thursday while I was working and my roommate was student teaching.
- FACT: The only known person to enter my room between 10:00 am. and 1:30 pm. on Thursday was a maintenance person.
- FACT: Maintenance was supposed to be repairing blinds in rooms and fixing screens.
- FACT: Maintenance was in my room not only on Thursday, but also on Wednesday and my broken blinds were not repaired.

As I said in the beginning, I'm not writing this letter to cry about my problems. I'm writing this letter because I feel that the policy allowing maintainance persons to enter our locked rooms without cur presence or our foreknowledge needs to be changed.

Not many residents are aware that main-'tenance: persons are entering their rooms a while they are on breaks. Not only are the residents unaware, but the RAs and RDs are also unaware. I propose that policies be adjusted so that students are informed by flyer or some other notice that maintenance will be entering their room over break. If residents were notified, they would be able to take the necessary measures to insure the safety of their valuables.

I also propose that maintenance not be allowed to have keys to our rooms. Entry into our rooms should be supervised. Since the RAs or RDs on duty over breaks know what break that they will be staying over, they should set up a day with maintenance to go to each room for these "routine" checks. This may be an inconvenience to the RA or RD but it would be a small gesture that would better insure the resident's privacy and make the residents feel more confident about the authenticity of these "routine" checks.

Granted, I understand that emergencies do occur over breaks and that maintenance may need to get into rooms on the spur of the moment at these times. However, in a case of this sort wouldn't it be normal procedure for the RA or RD on duty to be informed of the problem, so couldn't the RA or RD still supervise the entrance into the rooms? Yes, I believe so. I'd like to make it clear that I'm not

I'd like to make it clear that I'm not saying that maintenance cannot be trusted. I believe that maintenance as a whole does a very good job; but questions do arise because of the fact that maintenance persons do have keys to our rooms and are unsupervised upon entering them. I feel that policy needs to be changed and I sincerely hope that by writing this letter someone will take notice and not avoid this issue; any longer.






Decorating the Marian Library since March 4, dazzling us with color was Rhonda Tipton's Senior Art Exhibit.


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
