## Editorial

To those student readers of the Indianapolis Star:

We hope that there are a few students among the Star readers who are aware of the polished type of editorial prejudice and propaganda which is being fed to Indianapolis each day in the form of "unbiased news". We refer, of course, to the increased tempo of the personal attacks upon Mr. Kennedy and the Democratic Party during these, the climactic days, before the 1961 presidential election. It is our hope to call your attention to this disgrace and, in doing so, possibly arouse your "righteous indignation". We feel that the Star, in following their scandal policy, is not only violating the journalistic principle of presenting accurate and unslanted news, but is hurting its own reputation and the chances of its endorsed candidate as well. If Mr. Nixon does not carry Indiana (though he probably will) it will surely be through no fault of the Star and its publisher, Eugene C. Pulliam.

No amateur is this Mr. Pulliam, for he employs every device long known in the journalistic field to sway his readers. Though it is subtly executed, all headlines and stories are so worded to imply that the Democrats are heading the nation toward disaster and that they are guilty of all the opposition's regarding graft and corruption. Every article which deals with the religious question is exploited and blown up to vast importance: two examples of this are the out-of-proportion spreads given to the Puerto Rican situation and the various anti-Catholic statements by Baptist ministers. Of course, there is no reason

to even mention the numerous and loquacious editorials, the overwhelming majority of which emphasize Mr. Nixon's good qualities while going through great tribulations to convince the reader of Mr. Kennedy's short-comings.

There is no doubt in our minds that the Star is featuring slanted election articles and is far over-stepping the usual journalistic bounds in its support of Mr. Nixon and the Republican Party.

We are sure that few, if any, readers will be mesmerized by this propaganda and even more certain that if Mr. Kennedy is elected, there will be quite a few long faces at the Star, one in particular - that of Mr. Pulliam.
