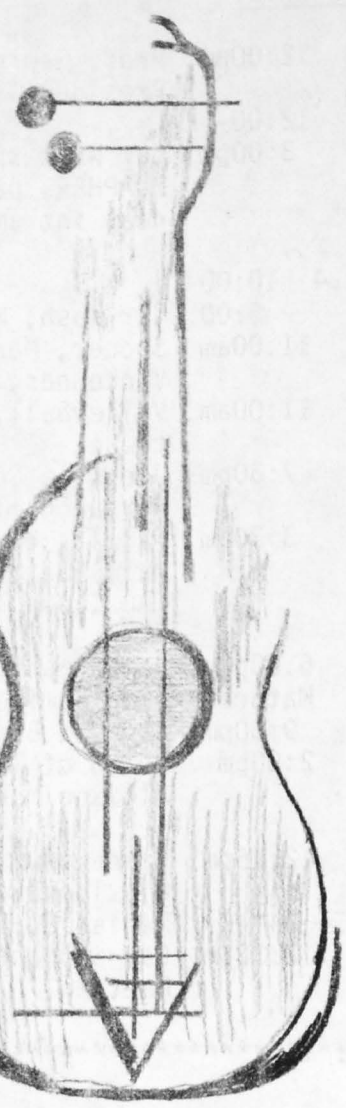

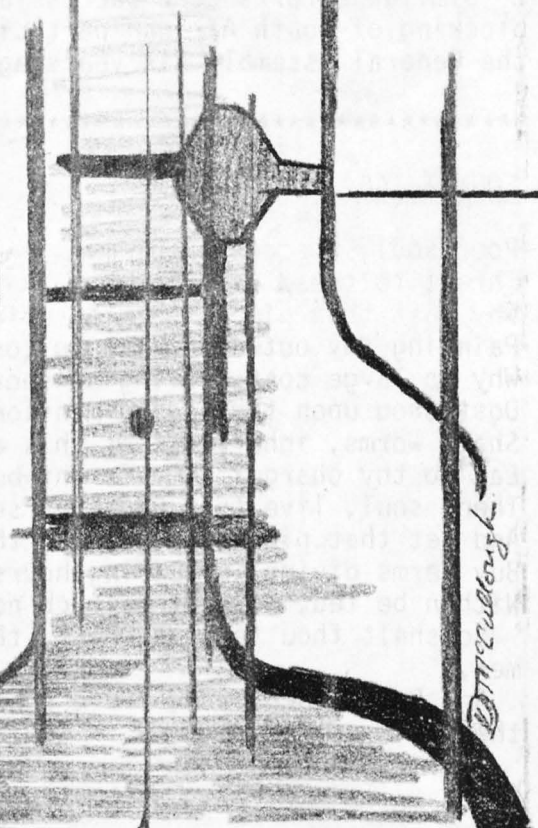

Attempt to expel Israel - Syria, Tuesday, urged the General Assembly of the United Nations "to reconsider Israel's membership in this international organization because it has constantly and systematically and obstinately been flouting the decisions of this assembly and organization."

The expulsion of Israel from the General Assembly was given little chance because of strong opposition from both American and Arab diplomats. President Carter indicated that such action, if taken by the United Nations, "would raise the gravest questions about the future of the General Assembly and further participation of the United States and other nations in the deliberations of that body."

Similar efforts were successful in the blocking of South African participation in the General Assembly six years ago.

NEWS

Iraq/Iran - Although it is certain that Iraq has made considerable land gains in Iran, reports of the Iraqi/Iranian undeclared war are so conflicting, it is difficult to discern truth from propaganda.

The fighting is centered on the two countries' oil ports and refineries on the Shatt-al-Arab waterway. Heavy damage has been reported and oil exports of both countries have been cut off, reducing by about 4 billion barrels a day the oil available to Western importers.

The Strait of Hormuz, the waterway into the Persian Gulf by which 60% of the Western world's oil passes, is still open despite Iranian threats to close it. Since the fighting erupted, however, there has been a 30% drop in oil tanker traffic.

Iraq has proposed a conditional four day cease-fire, which Iran has refused saying Iraq must first "put an end to the aggression against Iran and it must go back to original positions [it occupied] before the start of hostilities."

The U.S. and the Soviet Union have both declared a policy of neutrality in the conflict. The Iraqi government has struggled over the past few years to free itself from Soviet influence, refusing to allow a Soviet naval base in the Persian Gulf, for example. Twice since 1978, the Iraqi government has executed communists working within the government, viewing them as dangerous to the country. But the Soviet Union is still diplomatically bonded to both Iraq and Iran, while the U.S. has little influence on Iraq and no formal relations with Iran.

With the prospect of the conflict continuing for some time, Iraq may have to depend on the Soviets for military technological aid and reinforcement. This, along with the possibility of a peacemaking role, would assist the Soviets in regaining some of the influence it has lost in the Middle East over the past 10 years.

Train - Wednesday, October 1st, marked the opening of an Indianapolis to Chicago Amtrak run. The project, including \$12 million in track renovation, is the initial step in an eventual Cincinnati-Indianapolis-Chicago railroad line.

Complaints concerning the safety of the railroad tracks are being investigated. Rail workers claim that the tracks may be susceptible to "popping" in the winter months because of the lack of joints to allow the metal to contract in cold weather. A stretch of the route is also deficient of a "blocking signal" which forewarns the engineer of broken tracks.

The train is scheduled to make one round-trip each day with stops at Crawfordsville, Lafayette and Dyer.

Rev. Dr. Leopold Keffler, one of the new professors who joined the Biology Department this August, is a native of Canton Ohio. He professed as a member of the Conventional Franciscan Order in 1955 and entered Our Lady of Carey Seminary in Carey, Ohio. After four years of philosophy and theology here, Fr. Keffler moved on to Assumption Seminary and College in Minnesota where he completed his masters in religious sciences. He was ordained a priest in 1963.

After his ordination, Fr. Lepold entered the University of Mississippi and worked on his second Masters in Combined Sciences with an emphasis in Biology which was successfully completed in 1967. Fr. Leopold continued his education working on his Doctorate in Aquatic Biology with an emphasis on Limnology. He finished his dissertation on "The Study of the Influence of Calcium on the Effects of DDT on Fish" in 1972.

After finishing his Doctorate, he taught in the Biology Departments of Bellarmine College in Kentucky and St. Hyacinth College and Seminary in Massachusetts. He moved to Indiana in 1978 and worked at the Provincial Office at Mt. St. Francis until he joined us here at Marain.

During my conversation with this gracious, scholarly priest, I mixed in a few general questions:

What do you think of Marian College?

I enjoy it. I like the nice, warm family atmosphere here.

How do you feel about the students?

I have not been here long enough to answer that fully. But with my short experience, I find them comfortable and pleasant to work with. And from the class tests I recently evaluated, academically speaking, the level is high. I particularly enjoy the delightful nursing group.

Does your wearing of the habit have any effect on the student's relationship with you?

No adverse effect.

How do you feel about the changing of attire to suit the modern fashions?

Many of the stereotypes were confining, unreal and unnecessary. On the other hand, stereotypes help to identify structures, relationships, etc., and it is valuable. I have mixed feelings about it. Some are eased by the change while others are confused.

What is your opinion on the Church allowing married Anglican priests in?

I haven't read enough about it, but it's probably good. It could help achieve the ecumenical goal.

Would this change the Celibacy Rule?

Not for the time being, but this could increase the pressure for considering that possibility.

What do you think of women priests for the Catholic Church?

Anglicans who are opposed to the ordination of women in their church are joining us. It's difficult to predict the future on that topic. What do you think is the cause for the soaring divorce rates?

Less value for permanency.

Fr. Leopold agreed to discuss select topics in the future. We thank you, Fr. Leopold, for squeezing this interview into your busy schedule.

The meeting was called to order at 9:05pm. Members absent: Ann Hammond, Alice Back, Paula Sgambelluri, Connie Ryan, Bryan Cunningham and Mr. Elmendorf. Also present: Dean Woodman. The minutes of the September 23rd meeting were read and approved.

Treasurer's Report: \$2695.56

Committee Reports -

Social Planning: Ski trip possibilities include Boyne Mountain, Michigan, Paoli Peak and Canonsburg. The Brown County trip may be jointly sponsored by the photography club. They still need people to work at the movies on Halloween night at Allison from 9pm to 4pm.

NEW MEDICARE SUPPLEMENT NOW AVAILABLE

Metro-Health Plan is now available to Medicare recipients in the Indianapolis and surrounding areas. The MHP Medicare Supplement will coordinate benefits with Medicare and cover the gaps in coverage.

The concept of MHP is one of prepaid health care where the member pays the premium in advance. The member then uses the services whenever needed without hesitation because of expense or question of coverage. It is one complete system that delivers care as well as pays for health services. The personal MHP physician manages the member's medical needs including checkups and specialist referrals. Hospitalization is covered if authorized by the MHP physician. In addition, there are no claim forms to fill out. MHP files all claim forms.

Members select the medical office of their choice -- one on the northeast side of town at 3000 Meadows Parkway and the other in Speedway at 5610 Crawfordsville Road. Each medical center is complete with doctor's offices; x-ray department; laboratory; opometry department; emergency treatment rooms; pharmacy; and, at the eastside location, dental suites.

Each eligible Medicare recipient may freely select Metro-Health's Supplement. Information and enrollment forms are available by calling 542-8136.
