



TRAFFIC FINE PROCEDURES

Section 9.10, Debts and Fines of the current edition of the Code of Student Rights and Responsibilities states:

"Fines are to be paid at the Business Office within two weeks after assessment or receipt of parking violation ticket. Failure to do so is cause for withdrawal of the College parking permit and tow-away of the student's vehicle." (pg.21).

Appeal of Traffic and Parking Violations

1. All parking and traffic citations must be paid within two weeks of date of issuance at the Business Office. A cost of ten dollars (\$10) will be assessed, in addition to the amount of the fine, for late payment of traffic and parking violations.
2. Appeal of traffic and parking violations, may be made to the Traffic Committee through the Student Services Office. For an appeal petition to be considered, all appeals must be filed at Student Services within ten (10) days of issuance of the traffic citation.
3. If an appeal is filed within the ten (10) day period, payment of the fine is suspended pending the outcome of the appeal before the Traffic Committee.




