## In Fond Memory

On Friday, March 22, 1985, Monsignor John Doyle, 87, passed away in St. Vincent Hospital, where he was hospitalized due to a stroke. Monsignor Doyle, Archivist and historian of the Indianapolis Catholic Archdiocese, was founding chaplain and professor emeritus here at Marian.

After his ordination, May 17, 1921, he was appointed assistant pastor at St. Augustine Catholic Church in Jeffersonville. He joined the staff of Little Flower Catholic Church in 1927.

Monsignor Doyle joined the staff of Marian in 1937, after serving as an instructor and Assistant chaplain at St. Mary of the Woods College from 1933-1937. He was a member of Marian's staff from 1937-1969. In 1964, Marian College built the men's residence, Doyle Hall, in his honor. In 1971 he was presented with an honorary degree from Marian. Monsignor Doyle was laid to rest in Calvary Cemetery on Monday, March 25, 1985.

The following letter, Remembering Monsignor Doyle, was written by Sister Gertrude Marie, the only surviving founder of Marian College. We would like to share the letter with you, and we only ask that you remember Monsignor Doyle in your prayers.

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### Remembering Monsignor Doyle

The passing of the Reverend Monsignor John Doyle, Ph.D., L.H.D., professor emeritus of the college, is an occasion for mutual sympathy and grateful remembrance. Our loss is real and very great. Faith indeed assures us that God called him into Eternal Life of union with Himself, for which his 87 years were a consistent preparation. To quote one former student, "Monsignor Doyle will always be for me one of the greatest persons I have known--he lived what he taught." Naming Doyle Hall in his honor and conferring an honorary degree upon him at the time of his retirement were official expressions of appreciation.

For 32 years, 1937-1969, Monsignor shared his rare spiritual and intellectual gifts with administrators, faculty, staff, alumni, and students, in the capacity of chaplain, professor, friend. His interest in people was universal, but those in need, like the European refugee students on campus, or per-

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sons anywhere marginalized by racial or other forms of discrimination, were special beneficiaries. Giving his own World War II ration ticket to a refugee student in need of shoes, was one such occasion.

Of outstanding significance were his share in establishing the objectives of the college and in laying the foundation for curriculum development especially in the areas of philosophy and social studies. His comprehensive statistical studies helped to point out new directions in academic policies. He played an active role in organizing the Faculty Council. Historical research and other Archdiocesan commitments rounded out his program of activities.

At home in God's world of nature, Monsignor enjoyed studying the stars on one hand and cultivating simple garden flowers on the other. Perhaps the Scripture prayer chosen by him for his Golden Jubilee of Ordination remembrance, in 1971, would have a two-way significance now:

"I have loved, O Lord, the beauty  
of Thy house and the place where  
Thy glory dwells."

## Data Base Searching System

The Marian College Library through the help of Indiana Cooperative Library Services (ICLBSA) now has access to bibliographic retrieval service (BRS) in New York. They have access to roughly 85 data bases from BRS.

The data base system is a major resource for students to access additional material not available at the library. This system will help students interested in the biological and physical sciences, business, education, nursing or allied health professions, psychology and sociology.

There is only one drawback-the library has to pay \$60 a year to have this excess, but at Susan Stussy, head librarian, puts it, "It's really worth it, if the students get more information to help them."

## Depository Library

Depository Library? Isn't that what you call the little box that you keep all of your bank deposit slips in? No, a depository library is a collection of Government publications within an existing college, university, State, public or Federal library. These publications are available, free, to the public.

There are two main categories of depositories: selective and regional. Selective depositories receive the publications chosen by the individual Depository Librarians as appropriate to their collections. Regional depositories receive every available Government publication and have the responsibility of retaining them permanently.

Depository Libraries are filled with information on a variety of subjects, from gardening to energy resources. There are five Depository Libraries in Indianapolis. Four are Selective Depositories and they are located at 1.) Butler University, 2.) Indianapolis-Marion County Public Library (the main branch), 3.) Indiana University (School of Law Library), 4.) Indiana University-Purdue University Library. The Regional Depository is located at the Indiana State Library.

If you need information for a paper and you are having trouble finding information on your topic you might try using the Depository Library, after all it is FREE!!!

## Summer Housing

Room and Board will be available on campus to those Marian College students who will be enrolled in summer sessions. Housing contracts may be issued by the Dean of Students to cover the following periods: EARLY SESSION - Breakfast, May 13 through dinner, June 14 (\$369.00), LONG SESSION - Breakfast, May 13 through dinner, August 2 (\$916.00), SUMMER SESSION - Breakfast, June 17 through July 30 (\$492.00), and ROOM ONLY - 12-week contract --82 days-- (\$396.00).

The above contract plans include twenty meals per week including holidays. The charge per student per day before and after regular contract periods is \$12.85 per day.

Summer students will be housed in designated wings of Doyle and Clare Halls. Alverna Hall, and Clare Annex will not be used this summer. Single rooms are not available. Room only contracts are only available to BSN, RA, or RT students engaged in clinical courses away from campus. Special areas in Doyle and Clare will be set aside to house students this summer; current dorm students who plan to contract for housing during the summer months will be required to move into another room, unless they are currently living in the area designated for summer housing.

Summer housing contracts and information are available at the Student Services Office, first floor, Marian Hall.
