CIVIL RIGHTS OR WRONGS?

As the debate concerning the Civil Rights Bill continues in the Senate, we present the second in a series of summaries of the Bill's provisions. Last week, the first two provisions were presented. The following are the summaries of the next three provisions.

TITLE III - DESEGREGATION OF PUBLIC FACILITIES

"The Attorney General would be empowered to initiate or intervene in suits aimed at desegregating public facilities other than schools- such as parks, libraries, hospitals and playgrounds- where the injured party is unable to pursue the remedy. He would also be authorized to intervene in private actions brought by persons seeking relief from a denial of equal protection of the law because of race, creed, color or national origin."

TITLE IV - DESEGREGATION OF PUBLIC EDUCATION

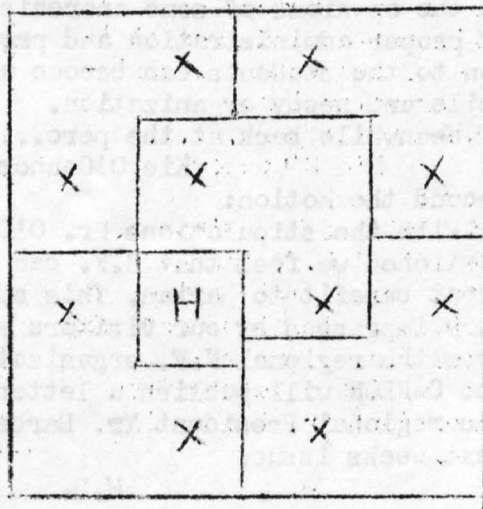
"It authorizes the Attorney General to initiate or intervene in school desegregation cases. It provides for technical assistance, grants and training institutes to help communities prepare for school desegregation. But it exempts from its definition of desegregation, the transportation of students to end racial imbalance."

TITLE V - COMMISSION OF CIVIL RIGHTS

"It would extend the life of the Commission to another four years and give it additional duties of investigating vote fraud cases and serving as a national clearing house on civil rights."
