Conduct Appeals

A poll was taken Wednesday concerning conduct review or appeals. Students were asked to choose among three possible systems.

1. A Conduct Review Board which will make

recommendations for rehearing to the Dean of Student Services.

2. A Conduct Appeals Committee which makes recommendations to the President.

3. A Conduct Appeals Committee which has final decision.

272 students took the poll. 43 voted for the first alternative, 40 for the second, and 189 for the third.

Faculty Council has already passed the system set up in the first alternative. Strong student opposition to this system has been shown through the Student Board motions, through a petition which collected 285 signatures, and now a poll. Students have made no unreasonable demands. They have only asked that their opinions on something which vitally concerns them be given some serious considerations. They have only been met with the refusal to accept the validity of their opinions, no matter how it is expressed. How does Faculty Council expect students to respect its decisions after such self-righteous disregard for student opinion.
