A committee is being formed to scrutinize the Marian College Judicial System, in hopes that it can be revised to the satisfaction of all those involved and to better serve its purpose.

In the second semester of last year, the judicial panelwas forced to make decisions which were not always popular with the majority of the population of the college.

Bill Federspiel, the vice-president of the Student Board, is the student in charge of organizing the committee. He feels this is a good chance to revamp the system and perhaps amend any hard feelings that may exist between students and the administration. Federspiel served one year on the Judicial Panel and knows well the pressures and responsabilities that are entailed in the job.

Dr. Drew Appleby of Marian's psychology department feels there is a need to look carefully at the policies, procedures, and the judicial system as a whole. He thinks there are too many people involved in the decision-making process and that there might be too much due process integrated into the system.

Dr. Abbleby also pointed out some discrepencies in the two judicial manuals, the Code of Student Rights and Responsibilities and the new Judicial Handbook, which were handed out to students. In one of the manuals, the rules state that a student can attend his/her appeals hearing, while the other states that a student cannot attend the hearing.

Appleby added that the system, as a whole, "frustrates the Resident Assistants and students and could be made a lot simpler, more consistant and more constant." Prior to the 1972-73 school year, the judicial system consisted of two people, the Dean of Student Services and the President of the College. The Dean heard the alleged disciplinary cases and then made the necessary decisions. If the student was unhappy with these decisions, he /she could appeal to the president.

In that same school year, the Conduct Appeals Board was established by the Faculty Council. This Board has put another step in the appeals process, between the Dean and the President. It's first full year of operation was the 1973-74 school year.

Dean William Woodman, who came to Marian in 1973, was dissatisfied with the system and proposed the creation of the Judicial Panel. He also helped to compose the current Code of Rights and Responsibilities. These two components were approved by both the College Council and the Student Affairs Committee. They were adopted in the spring of 1974 and went into effect the following year.

In February of 1975, the final component of the system, the Admin istration Action Policy, was put into effect. This policy includes the assessment of fines and work penalties for disciplinary offenses. The student doesn't have to accept these penalties and can instead opt for an appearance before the Judicial Panel, a fact which most students seem to be ignorant of, according to Dean Woodman.

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ONCE UPON A TIME-AT MARIAN COLLEGE

This is a story about communication, or perhaps we should say the lack of it. I'm sure by now most of the upperclassmen and some of the new students realize there is a lack of communication between students and the administration.

A very good example of this has been brought to the attention of the Carbon staff: the recent write-up of five female Marian College students. The students were caught by a Marian College security guard while leaving Doyle Hall after visitation hours.

It was not clear to the students or the Carbon staff what right the guard had in stopping these students; nor was the amount of his involvement in the write-up totally understood.

In talking to members of the administration and staff, we found that the security guards are allowed to enforce the <u>Student Code Book of Rights</u> and <u>Responsibilities</u>. (In case you don't know what that is, it's the little book handed out at the beginning of the school year, which every Marian student should have time to read, but somehow never can find the time.)

When the students were interviewed by the Carbon, they still had not learned the outcome of the decision made by the Dean and the R.D.s. (The interview was held eight days after the incident occurred.)

When the R.D. was questionned on the policy of write-ups, we were informed the decision had been made. Unfortunately, the R.D. had not had time to inform thestudents of the decision.

We on the Carbon staff think there is a certain amount of inconsistency in this procedure when compared with the appeals procedure.

As stated in the Residence Life Guide Book: If a student wishes to appeal their write-up before the Judicial Panel, the student must present the appeal within three days of receiving notification. We, the staff, feel that in both cases, students should be better informed.

The Carbon staff asks the administration to inform the student body of the rights of security guards pertaining to student conduct. We also ask the administration to review the current policy dealing with writeups and definate guidelines concerning the amount of time allowed to inform the students of the consequences of their actions.

The presence of Fort Benjamin Harrison, Army Finance Center, Detroit Diesel Allison, and Naval Avionics in Indianapolis, places Indianapolis high on the target list.

The lecture was based on an article published by Mason and Gary Kyzr-Sheely, a professor at Franklin College, in the April 1982, issue **•** Indianapolis Monthly magazine.

BASEBALL


The baseball team is starting its fall tryouts under the direction of Coach Lynn Morrell. Thirty - two men are vying for a place on the roster.


