STUDENT SPOTLIGHT:

MOHAMMAD LATIFI

—Nancy Smith

Mohammad Latifi, 21- year old freshman student at Marian, has been in the United States for two years. His home is in Tehran, Iran. He first attended Indiana Tech. in Fort Wayne. There he heard about the language center at Marian. After finishing the ELS program, Mohammad decided to attend Marian because it was too late in the summer to apply to other schools. Mohammed has since grown to like Marian and the people.

"American people, for the most part, are nice to foreign people. But when they don't know them, they don't talk to them."

Mohammed writes letters to his family in Iran quite often, but doesn't mail them.

"The letters don't go through," he said, "but Khomeini is working on getting things moving again."

Mohammad expressed strong opinions about the inner turmoil of Iran.

"Khomeini is a good leader because he can make the people do what he wants. But he does not make a good politician because he hasn't studied politics and he doesn't have the background. He has been in exile for fifteen years. You must live among the people to know what is going on."

When asked what he would like to see for Iran, he said he would like all of the different groups to discuss and reach a final decision that would satisfy the majority of the people. He believes that it is important for the CIA to get out of Iran. He feels they are corrupt because "they try to order the Government around."

The following letter was anonymously submitted to the CARBON on a 7-foot length of toilet paper. As it appeared in the Carbon office it appears here:

Dear Carbon Editors,

I was just reading the Carbon, my favorite on-campus newspaper, and noticed there was no good philosophical question being debated. Knowing that this was once a Carbon calling card I wonder if you have just quit publishing them or is it simply that they have quit being written. If so, this is a great loss not only to me but to the whole college. What ever happened to the college students concern for thought-provoking issues. Discussion of Hume, Kant, Kierkegaard, or even Pedtke. What is good? What is moral? What is whatness? Even intelligent discussions of current issues would be nice. Somebody must care whether Carter's peace mission fails, or succeeds. What is going to happen if inflation continues for another five years? Are they going to make thicker toilet paper?

Why do people submit mundane APPLAUDS and hisses when they could be contributing to the knowledge of all members of the college community in areas other than the mating behavior of the human species? If they must force the issue why not discuss something of general interest like, is it true that half the men at Doyle Hall can't have a meaningful relationship without becoming completely submissive to the women they hold in such high esteem as to grant them their presents? Rather than go on with this issue I would prefer to submit my own topic for discussion. Since the 1950's "men from outer space" have been seriously considered as a possibility. My question is : If there really are intelligent beings in outer space or even unknown to us on our own planet, where do they fit in to our present theological beliefs? Man has continually considered himself the center of the universe, it is long past due that man should realize he is probably only one of many possible intelligent races. Man considers himself the apple of God's Eye, but is he? Depending on which theory adhered to, man is either a great accident or an intentional creation. The first is probable easy to adapt to the fact that other intelligent races besides man exists. But the latter is a bit different. If man was created for a specific purpose.....well before I wear myself out I must be gone. I hope you, the Editors will continue to publish a fine weekly. Three gifted Marian faculty members have recently been recognized for their creative endeavors in art, literature and higher education.

Elli Siskind, an art instructor here, received both "Best in Show" and "Museum Purchase Award" at the Fort Wayne Museum of Art's 44th Annual Tri-Kappa Regional Art Exhibition. The art show there is on display through April 26.

Her acrylic painting, titled "Going Nowhere Fast" was the top choice of Dr. John Hallmark Neff, director of the Chicago Museum of Contemporary Art, for a price of \$485. The purchase award was made by the Alliance of the Fort Wayne Museum.

Two poems, by the Carbon faculty advisor, Dr. Drew C. Appleby, have been selected by the Metropolitan Arts Council for illustration and display on Metro bus cards.

Dr. Appleby, psych prof., received \$50 in the Council's Poetry in Public Places Project for his poems entitled "Dawn breaking slowly..." and "The Last Gardener."

The Danforth Foundation of St. Louis has announced the appointment of Sister Sue Bradshaw to its Danforth Associate Program. The program offers opportunities for interdisciplinary and inter-institutional activities among faculty.
