There is a hum of excitement on the first floor of the Administration Building at M.C. this week. Perhaps this hum is due to the start of a new semester, or to the relief of tension; but neither of these two factors seem to be the reason. The real reason is the arrival of Dr. Dominic Guzzetta, Marian's new President. Dr. Guzzetta is busy meeting and discussing with students and faculty, busy hustling from one office to the next and busy planning and initiating new programs. This excitement, though, does not eminate from merely Dr. Guzzetta's presence, but from his warm and friendly attitude. A warm and friendly attitude that he is pledging to use to accomplish new highs for Marian.

One of the new programs initiated by Dr. Guzzetta is the President's Student Advisory Board. The Board is to be made up of nine students, chosen by the President in consultation with the Student Board as representative of the college community. Plans are tentatively set for regularly scheduled bi-monthly meetings with the Board, the first meeting set for 5:30 p.m., Monday, February 12. Dr. Guzzetta looks upon the establishment of the committee not as a means of circumventing or cluttering existing means of communication on campus, but as atangible way to improve campus communication. He hopes that both this committee and the other existing committees and communicative links on camous will adopt and implement his 3 c's program - confer, consult and communicate. Dr. Guzzetta says he will feel very frustrated if, after coming from a school of 14,500, he is not able to strengthen the communicative links at Marian, a school of

The Student Advisory Board looks good on paper and sounds good in discussion, but i's true test will be in its functioning. Adequate functioning will rest on the shoulders of all involved, especially the students, to use this committee for their benefit. Membership on the committee is still tentative and those students tentatively appointed include: Tom Turner, Fay Faivre, Steve Miller, Maureen Coleman, Chuck Welch, Larry Brodnick, Nancy Rosenacker, Eileen

Fleetwood and, yours truly, John O'Kane.

The Board represents only one of the wave of new ideas and plans that Dr. Guzzetta has for Marian. His goals are high and his convictions are firm, but the true test now awaits him.

Q. Has the Student Personnel Office made an official statement in regard to searching resi-

A. The Student Personnel Office is now in the process of formulating such a statement, says Steve Miller, President of the Doyle Hall Board. On January 15, 1968 Mr. Fields issued a memorandum to Sister Estherand Mr. Reeves, concerning "Room Cleaning and Excess Articles." That memo stated: "In the event rooms cannot be properly cleaned etc., (for any reason) please make a report to Mr. Lehmer or Mr. Fields immediately. Do not remove any articles from the rooms without prior instructions from these people."

Q. What has the Academic Affairs Committee accomplished?

The Student Academic Affairs Committee has met three times this year. Some ideas the committee has discussed are: faculty and course evaluation through questionnaires, a study period before finals, an examination of the present grading system and possible adoption of the passfail system, textbook evaluation, termination of the second semester prior to the 500 mile race, evaluation of the seniors by the faculty and a counter-evaluation of the faculty by seniors majoring in their departments, and elimination or an alternative to Senior Comprehensives.

Q. Why is it that the faculty is to vote on Clare Hall hours when they did not vote on the hours for Doyle Hall?

A. Miss Diver stated: "Because the Student Welfare Committee was not operative at the time of Doyle Hall's request for open hours, that decision was made by the Student Personnel Office. The Coordinator of Student Personnel, Mr. Fields, began efforts to activate that Committee about a year ago; this year the Committee, with student members, has been meeting and acting on proposals. Had Doyle Hall's request been made this year, it would have been discussed by the Student Welfare Committee and if passed by them, referred to the faculty."


