College Plans Cooperative Study

A study designed to help colleges plan work that will be stimulating to students is being undertaken by Marian with the combined work of Huntington, Marion and Taylor. A research project that will be carried on for several months, the first inquiry will be made this week. The students and faculty will be asked to name the five students who are the most intellectually stimulated and the five who are least stimulated. The instruction sheets and blanks to be filled out can be obtained in the information office until 12:00 Thursday. You will not have to sign your name and the students named on the papers will not know about their selection. In fact, the results will not be published in any way that would reveal any choices made. The whole survey will be used to help determine the type of student that seems to show the greatest intellectual awareness and interest in learning. The person you name need not have the highest grades but rather should be one who is willing to go out of his way to learn something interesting or necessary to his own development. In brief the person who has responded to the purpose of college, not one who is interested only in the prestige of a degree or a high salary afterwards. This study is being made for the purpose of improving collegiate training and any cooperation you can lend to the project will be appreciated.
