Student Services is the home away from home for one of Marian's most significant administrators. Dean Bill Woodman came to Marian at the beginning of the second semester of the 1973 - 74 school year. His arrival was not immediately noticed by the student body probably because the Dean is not a very noticeable man. He is like a lurking shadow hanging ominously in the background.

No Dean of Student Services has ever been very popular with the students. Resentment because of his role of prosecutor is part of the job. But Woodman seems to be more unpopular than his predecessor.

Woodman's most impressive achievement so far has been the initiation of the Judicial Panel. It is quite an accomplishment because it took the duty of judging college policy offenders from the Dean and placed it on a body of people of which three out of seven are students. As a result, the sentences are in proportion with the rules that are broken.

The Judicial Panel made Dean Woodman a popular man for a while, however, as time passed it eventually backfired. Student offenses have become a major topic of campus gossip. When he walks through the Caf or the Perc, he glances suspiciously out of the corner of his eye at the people around and mutters hellos to the familiar.

The man is not paid to be popular, but it would make his job easier. The name 'Student Services' implies that there are direct dealings between the Dean and the students. Cooperation in such cases is essential. If the two parties cannot get along, the road is going to be long, hard and rocky.
