JUDICIAL COMMITTEE **EXAMINES POLICY CHANGES**

During a recent organizational meet-ing of the Judicial Panel Committee, it was emphasized that Judicial Panel hearings are open hearings and suggested that decisions of the panel be made public.

The suggestion was made by Father Leopold, who feels that many of Marian students are intimidated by the panel and that by posting the findings students would see "aquittal is legally as possible a conclusion as conviction."

"If our judicial proceedings are to be an educational process rather than punitive, then they should be out in the open; because educational processes should be open," stated Fr. Leopold..

lawyers consulted by the chairman of the Judicial Panel recommended against official publication of the committee's decision's. Therefore, the suggestion will not be implemented.

Fr. Leopold's reaction: "It makes me angry that we live in fear of legal repercussions."

Judicial Panel Hearings are held on Tuesdays at 3:30 p.m. if there is a case to be heard. The meetings are open to the public unless the defendent requests that they be: closed.

The function of the panel is to see that justice is accomplished on campus. Therefore, the question as to whether the college has the moral and/or legal right to publish findings has arisen.

According to the Buckley Ammendment (the Privacy Act) an institution such as Marian College can not legally publish private information about individuals.

last Tuesday, the women's vol-leyball team went down in defeat against Butler and Yavier.


The Knights traveled to Marion, on the 18th, and lost one and won one. The scores were; against Marion 12-15, 10-15, and Hunington 15-10,


