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## Guerrettaz named top senior

The Marian College Twelfth Annual Student Achievement Program was held on Sunday, April 24, at 2:30 in the Marian Hall Auditorium. It recognized outstanding students in academics, clubs and organizations, and athletics.
The highlight of the afternoon was the presentation of the Alumni Association Distinguished Senior Award to David Guerrettaz forhisparticipation in numerous extracurricular activities, his maintenance of a 4.0 grade average, and his service to the Marian community. A new plaque has been donated by Mr. Timothy J. O'Neill and the First Indiana Bank which includes the names of previous distinguished seniors.
Dr. Louis Gatto then introduced the key speaker, Mr. William T. Kelsey. Kelsey graduated from Marian in 1961 with a degree in accounting. He encouraged students to set goals for themselves, strive to reach those goals, and then re-evaluate. He
said, "You might have to knock on a few doors to find opportunities, but the risk is well worth it. You should be willing to accept 'no' and afterwards try a different approach." Most of all, he wants students to meet the challenges they will face during their lives.
Sr. Claire Whalen announced the recipients of academic awards. She feels these students are not only developing themselves through their education but are motivating the educators as well. Awards were presented to students in the following fields: accounting, biology, education, language, home economics, mathematics, nursing, radiologic technology, and theater.
The Campus Ministry Christian Service Award was presented to senior Mike Minton by Fr. Bryan.

## Student center

The proposed construction of a student centeratMarian is a topic of importance and interest to all of us. In 1986 the college received reaccreditaon from the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. During that process, the student center was identified as the college's top priority. Thathas notchanged.
The high priority placed on the student center project remains upper-most in the minds of the administrators. Admittedly, there have been setbacks in the timetable which was a part of our most optimistic dreams. The process has moved ahead at the Board of Trustees and administration levels. President Gatto has repeatedly confirmed his commitment to the project.
Early in this academic year, the Board of Trustees appointed a new Strategic Planning Committee. Bain Farris, Chairman of the Board, challenged the committee to consider many factors in Marian's future. Among these was the projected need for facilities and the priority placed on the student center project.

Acting upon the recommendations of President Gatto and Mr. Farris, the Board recently retained a strategic planning consultant to assist in the process of overall institutional planning. He too is looking at the total needs of the institution and is well aware of the priority placed on the need for a student center. He should complete his fact-finding early this summer.

Members of the board, President Gatto, and I have recently visited with potential "major donors" to request and encourage their support. Should these prospective
donors decide to become donors of substantial "leadership" gifts, the timetable for launching a general fundraising campaign could possibly be established.

Like President Gatto and Mr. Farris, I would like to be able to make promises about the outcome of the strategic planning process, the proposals to prospective donors, timetables, and a definite construction date. To do so would be premature and irresponsible. The strategic planning process which is underway is exciting and will prove to be a positive factor in Marian College's future. I can assure everyone that the commitment to the project remains strong and that both the Board of Trustees and the administration are continually working to make the proposed student center a reality.

## Conference director resigns

Janet Padgett Alexander, Director of Conferences and Events at Marian College, announced her resignation, effective May 12,1988 . She said her decision to resign is based on the need for new direction and ideas in the program. "I have built what I believe to be a very fine program that has succeeded in its goals as far as I can take it," said Alexander.
A 1984 Marian graduate, Alexander was hired in October 1985 to fill the newlycreated position. Her duties have included scheduling and planning dinners, meetings, summer camps, and parties in Allison Mansion, Marian Hall, the college library, and other campus buildings. The Conferences and Events program, built and managed by Alexander with minimal resources, presently draws approximately $\$ 100,000$ into college funds, according to Alan Lisle,

Director of College Relations and Alexander's supervisor.
"The timing of my resignation is very important," said Alexander. Summer is the least hectic season for the program. It is the ideal time for a successor to come into the program, to see all the established events, and to begin to operate the program in his own style.
Lisle is currently interviewing several people to fill the position. He plans tomake a decision by the end of the this week as to who will be hired.
Alexander named freelance work as a party consultant and possibly returning to school as future plans. "I need to go out and get some new ideas of my own...new, innovative, growth things. I'll never rule out the possibility of coming back to Marian," she said.

This past weekend members of the Marian cross country team took part in a fundraising event. The purpose was to raise money for the cross country program through running. The team ran a total of 55 miles on Saturday and Sunday. Starting at 7 a.m. on Saturday, the Knights traveled 34 miles!
Before lunch, they had covered a grueling 26 miles through excruciating, hilly terrain. The team broke for an hour to recuperate. At about 1 p.m. they started off again into the warm afternoon sun, to finish the days workout of 8 miles. These miles were the hardest to get through because everyone was so exhausted.
The Knights arrived at the Center Grove Resort for their Saturday night stop-over, around 3 p.m. They proceeded to set up

Seven games remain in Marian's best season ever: conference double headers against Bethel and Goshen and games against the University of Indianapolis and Taylor University. The NAIA District 21 Tournament in Anderson on May 11-15, the semifinals in Ohio the following week, the World Series of college baseball in Idaho at the end of May -- all remain in sight.
