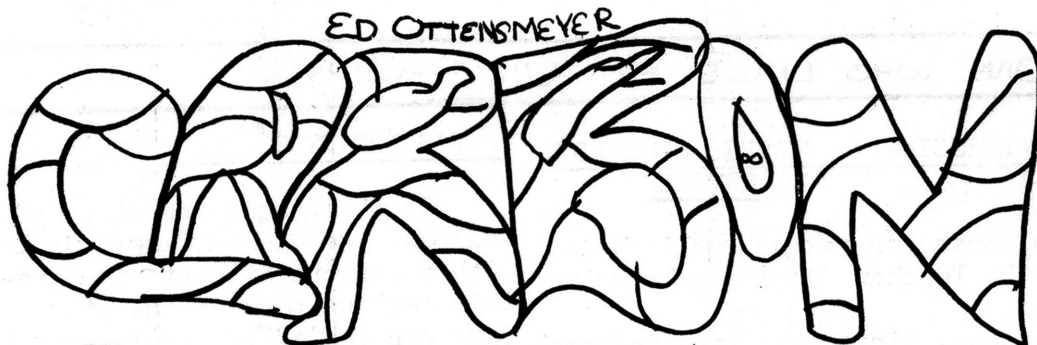

APPLICATIONS FOR ADMISSION TO TEACHER EDUCATION PROGRAM

March is the month for making application for admission to the Teacher Education Program at Marian College.

Application forms, directions, and information about requirements for teaching in the elementary and secondary schools will be available next Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday (March 7, 8, and 9) in Room 211.

Completed applications must be submitted by March 22 for consideration this semester by the Committee on Teacher Education. Interviews will be scheduled as applications are received. (Since Easter is early this year most interviews will be scheduled after the Easter vacation.) See main bulletin board for announcement of interview assignments.

Though applications are usually made in the sophomore year, students at junior standing may apply at the risk of not being able to complete all requirements for teaching before graduation.

The Knights finished 16-9 for the season, dropping their last two encounters. Ice cold shooting told the story, for this was the only change in Marian's play. The season shooting average dropped nearly 2½ per centage points (about .490 to .465) in the last three contests. Jean Ancelet led the charge in the 86-66 loss at Anderson with 21 points. Bob Hericks was high with 16 markers at St. Joe, where the Knights dropped the season finale, 91-69.

Numerous records were set by this year's squad which will return at full strength next year. Congrats to Cleon for the good year! He even smiles every other day.
