TO THE MASSES:

An editorial comment purporting a "lack of identity" at Marian College recently appeared in the Criticon. Fr. Thomas C. Widner raised the question of "whether or not Catholic colleges have any value at all as centers of religious faith for 18-22 year olds." These statements quite naturally aroused much concern here at Marian, and several people, including President Gatto, responded with letters to the Criticon in defense of the school. The letters demonstrate that Marian does indeed have defined objectives and objectives. However, Fr. Widner's original statements would seem to indicate a "gap" exists between Marian's reality as seen by those in the college community and the image viewed by those outside the community.

As members of the 18-22 year old group (those ages should surely be extended) we, the students, might do well to present our opinions. When Fr. Widner asks if higher quality education and emphasis on religious faith are incompatible, I have to reply that they are not. I challenge anyone to convince me that my education has suffered because I chose to attend Marian College. The competence of the faculty and their genuine concern for the students are traits which give Marian considerable advantages over other schools. Similarly, I can review my personal biography and see the development of a stronger religious faith, as a result of attending Marian College. Somehow, it is satisfying to recognize a personal faith, and acknowledge this faith with insight gained through study in a Philosophy course, a Sociology course and a Theology course. Certainly there are numerous opportunities for worship through ministry and church services as well.

Perhaps an historical view of spirituality is necessary. I doubt that those who experience spiritual awareness are a minority here, and I further suggest that Marian College is a "center of religious faith." It is possible that religiosity does not manifest itself in the same way that it did 15 years ago, and failure to recognize this fact is bound to result in a perceived lack of spirituality. Many people, myself included, believe that Marian is not lacking in this respect, and maybe it is our responsibility to make others aware of our belief.

For the first time in several years, a Marian student has been chosen as a "500" princess for the annual "500" race festivities held during the month of May. Veronica Lewis, a junior Music major, was one of the lucky 33 girls to be "500" princesses for 1979.

There were 252 contestants from all over the state who entered the contest held Saturday, February 17. Qualifications for entering the contest were that the applicant had to be going to a college in Indiana, carrying over 12 hours of credit, have a "C" average, be between 18-23 years old, and have been a resident of Indiana for 3 years. All the princesses will be outfitted by J.C. Penny, and their clothes will consist of identical 17-piece wardrobes. March 12 there will be a press party for all the princesses. Additionally, sponsors were provided by the "500" festival committee for each girl. Sponsors provide a place to stay in Indy, for those princesses who are from out of town.

Four additional Marian students entered the contest; however, Veronica will be the only representative from the college at the final pageant on March 17. Channel 4 will televise the contest which will determine the "500" Queen and her court. The Queen will win a \$2,500 scholarship and a pace car. The final selection process will include an interview and learning of a dance step which each contestant must perform in front of the judges.

Part of Veronica's duties as a "500" princess will be activities at the Children's Museum, the Mayor's luncheon, the Queen's Ball, and attending the race itself.

Besides the recognition, memories and wardrobe, Veronica is excited about being chosen, because for her it means "Being in the public alot". "Since I'm going into performing (opera), the main thing for me is to be seen," comments Veronica.

Those at Marian will have the chance to see Veronica as the leading lady in, "Man of La Mancha", held February 23-24 and March 3-4.

According to Sr. Rose, of the chemistry dept., the
lectures should be informative not only for chemistry
students but for all students at Marian.

"The Use of Pesticides in the Grain Industry" was
the first scheduled topic. James Moseley, elevator
supervisor at Central Soya Company, spoke on the
benefits and dangers of pesticides, today, and in the
future.

Carl Shonk, Ph.D. and member of the Chemistry
Dept., at Central Michigan University, will speak
March 1, 1979. His topic will be "Food Additives
Intentional and Otherwise," held at 12 Noon, in Rm.
355, in Marain Hall.

"Energy in the Future" is the topic for Mr. Robert
Knyter's talk. A consulting engineer, Mr. Knyter
received his B.S. degree from Purdue University.
Mr. Knyter's lecture will take place March 8, 1979
in Room 355 at 12 Noon, in Marain Hall.

Robert E. Van Atta, from the Department of Chemis-
try at Ball State University, should provide an inter-
esting lecture and demonstration. Mr. Atta will be
demonstrating student-built electrochemical instruments.
He will also discuss the cost of commercial chemical

at 12 Noon, in Room 355 in Marian Hall.

a few water colors. Her work is mainly realistic, but
the abstract will also be depicted.

Anne is looking forward to student teaching at
Roncalli High School, her alma mater, in a few weeks.
She is eager to share her artistic ideas and plans
with the students. She only hopes that her younger
brother and his friends don't make things too unpre-
dictable for her.

After graduation, Anna would like to teach in the
Indianapolis vicinity, but she is anxious to get into
other areas of art. She's particularly interested in
illustration and lettereing, the graphic side of creating.
Sometimes she wishes she "could be like George
Plimpton, trying fifty million different things!"

on the advertising arts in her exhibit, which runs
from April 1st until the 20th. Many theater logos

experience she's gaining and the contacts she's
making through the station.

Looking toward an eventual career in the advertising
side of the theater arts, Susan's is a familiar face
to Marain College Drama fans. She realizes that
in order to fully understand the flavor of the theater
you must experience it both on the stage and be-

Master of Public Affairs

Designed as a 48 credit-hour professional program for students with little experience in the public sector. The program offers both theoretical and practical preparation for public service. Because the emphasis of the School is interdisciplinary, there is no requirement for specific undergraduate major.

Master of Science in Environmental Sciences

Designed as a 48 credit-hour professional program for individuals having a BS degree in Mathematics, Natural and Physical Sciences, or Engineering.

winners of 5 of their last 6 games. The Knights need a victory to help insure their play-off bid hopes, that will come out Monday morning. The 13 wins is the most by a Marian Basketball team since the 1937-74 season, which was also the last time the Knights had a winning season and made the play-offs. The Knights had their 4-game winning streak broken last Saturday Night when Indiana Tech. beat them for a second time this year, this time by a score of 48-46. The Knights came from 10 back, 40-30, with nine minutes left, to take the lead 46-44 on John Brinkley's shot with three minutes to go, only to lose when Tech. scored a lay-up at the buzzer. The Knights were led by Chad Miller and George Chatman both scoring nine points. The Knights also lost their leading scorer, Bryan Mills, for the rest of the season with injuries he suffered in a fall during the second half of the game.

On Tuesday night the Knights, in a make-up game, defeated their old District 21 nemesis, Bethel, by a score of 80-62. The knights took the lead for good 7-4, on George Chatman's three-point play and never looked back, as they led by as many as 24 points, 80-56, in their second victory of the season over the Pilots. The Knights were led by 5 people scoring in double figures, Phil Savari - 13, Jim Brothers - 12, George Chatman - 11, Brendon McGeehan - 10, and Dale Wernke - 10.

The Junior Varsity Knights gained a split in their two games for the week. On Monday they routed an outmanned Indiana Baptist College by the score of 129-62. All eight Knights hit double figures and they were led by Alan Bucks - 26, Gary Weber-24, and Dan Greenlee-16. On Wednesday night they closed out their second season under Coach Greg Deaton, with an 85-76 loss at Wabash making their season record 4-10 (and only one snow-out, Congrats "Big D").

The Knights close out their third season under Coach John Grimes on Saturday night, at Grace, at 8:00. Following that they will hopefully begin practicing for the District-21 Playoffs. We hope you will follow us in our playoff endeavors, after all, we're Your Knights!!!
