## Administration Cancels Sceduled Spring Musical

The actors and actresses arrived at auditions on Jan. 11 at 7:00 p.m. with music in hand to try out for the spring musical "Chigago". Dissappointment fell on their faces as they found out that auditions were cancelled because Chicago was pulled from the itenerary.

The scheduled Spring Musical "Chicago", was discontinued by the administration at Marian, due to its content. According to some, the musical was too sexual and violent.

Chicago is a musical comedy about murderesses in prison. The main plot centers around the women competing for the best headlines so they will gain popularity and get out of prison sooner. The comedy does contain scenes involving sex. In the opening act one of the female leads is seen in bed with her lover, whom she later kills.

Although the musical contained some material that was considered inappropriate for a Catholic college, the students were disappointed in the decision.

"It's called censorship, and I don't like it," freshman Andrea Firestone complained.

At auditions the director Bart Simpson thanked the students for showing up, apologized for wasting their time, and told them to come back for auditions on Tues., Jan. 18.

"Hopefully, we will have chosen another musical by then," Simpson said.

Several students stayed in the auditorium after the announcement was made to offer suggestions on a new musical. On Tues., Jan. 18, the students learned that the new musical would be "Working", a concept musical based on the book by Stuks Turkel.

A concept musical revolves around a center theme rather than a central plot. "Working" takes place during one work day, and is about people in different professions. The characters include a truck driver, a housewife, a retiree, a steel worker, a business woman, and various secretaries. The musical numbers include

songs written by James Taylor, and offer a variety to the average musical reporatore.

Despite the downfall this semester with the musical, the cast seems excited about the show. Rehearsals began on Mon., Jan. 24 for the performances in the end of February. The play production class, taught by Bart Simpson, will begin working on the set soon. The choreographer for the show is Sunday Tyner, the assistant choreographer is

Noreen Nyikos, and the musical director is Sara Reid. The cast and crew anxiously await the opening of this concept musical on Thurs. Feb. 24.

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## Witte Reviews Pulitzer Prize Winning Poet

My first taste of Gary Snyder's work was bittersweet. I found his collection of poems, Riprap, difficult and frustrating. I could not weave together the dis-jointed phrases in his poetry. I read many of the poems five or six times, but only a handful fell together in my mind. I had been spoiled by long flowing lines in rhymed iambic pentameter.

The key to Snyder's poetry rests quietly in the title poem from Riprap. According To Snyder, the word "riprap" means "a cobble of stone laid on steep, slick rock to make a trail for horses in the mountains." The first lines of the poem "Riprap" read:

Lay down these words
Before your mind like rocks.
placed solid, by hands
In choice of place, set
Before the body of the mind
in space and time:
Solidity of bark, leaf, or wall
riprap of things:
I learned to read Snyder's poems as

thoughtfully placed cobbles to give footing

to the horse of our minds.

Snyder ran with the beat generation: Kerouac, Ginsberg and Burroughs; studied Zen buddhism and Eastern culture in Kyoto, Japan; spent time speaking with and understanding Native Americans from the west; and wrote about these things. Unfortunately his knowledge is so simply stated in his poetry that the inattentive reader mistakes them for only dexcriptions of rocks and trees, and streams, and hills.

The landscape of Snyder's poems only unlocks meaning when the reader understands his belief that all North Americans need to find a spiritual center within our land. He believes that the problems of the United States, Canada and Mexico will fade away when we see ourselves as Natives of North America—or rather "Turtle Island." As Snyder explained, "America was named by someone who never got here after someone who never got here." Turtle Island is a term taken from Native American creation stories that is used to

describe North America. Turtle Island is also a term used by the growing Bioregionalism movement which strives to make peace between modern Americans and their land.

Snyder's dreams of Turtle Island, where all live harmoniously with the land, were translated by his masterful reading into the vehicle of his poetry. The riprap that at first confused me soon became appropriate. Riprap lightly treads on the land, and indicates man tiptoeing through nature. The super-highway of long flowing structured lines would smother the land. Native Americans would not write in super highways. In Turtle Island all poetry is riprap.

#### **Editorial**

#### In the Best Interest of the Students

Indianapolis reached unexpected lows earlier this month with temperatures falling into the negative teens, and windchills as low as 39 degrees below zero. The onslaught of this weather brought many reactions; cars wouldn't start, people went without water because their pipes were frozen, and two people died. On Monday, Jan. 17 through Wednesday, Jan. 19 were flooded with school closings and activity cancellations.

On Tuesday, Jan. 18, Indianapolis woke up to temperatures of negative 15 degrees and as the radio and television stations listed the school closings and read the weather report, Marian students listened. They listened to the high for the day (zero degrees). They listened to the windchill factor(negative 39). They listened to the school closings, and waited for Marian to be mentioned. After a while, it was; classes would begin at 10:30.

As Marian students heard this, questions nagged at them. Why didn't Marian cancel class when the weather was obviously dangerous? Why did classes start at 10:30? Did the cars start at 10:30 any quicker than they would at 8:30? Did the ice and snow magically melt? Did it get any warmer?

It did get a little warmer (if negative 10 degrees is warmer); but the ice and snow remained, and cars still wouldn't start. So what was the reasoning behind Dr. Felicetti's decision to have class on Tuesday? The reason that makes the most sense is that the professor's are being paid to teach the students, and a missed day would be a waste of money.

Does this reason make much more sense, though? The students do not pay to have their classes shortened on a day when there is an all school mass. Is a mass more important than the student body's well being? Is it more important when there is a percentage of students who attend Marian that are not Catholic? The decision to hold classes so as not to waste the students' money is duly noted; however, it was not in the best interest of the students.

Meteorologists warned people not to expose their skin to the extreme temperatures if they could avoid it. It is a long walk from Doyle Hall to Marian Hall, as well as to the Music Building. Is it safe to assume that students expected and were prepared for this? Whether they expected it or not, they did not have the outer-wear necessary to protect them from the extreme temperatures. Even if students did have the clothes to keep warm, the sidewalks and parking lots were a hazard. Sidewalks and parking lots were not cleared, and the walkway from Stokely Mansion to the Music Building did not get shovelled until Wednesday.

Whether the administration took these facts into consideration before making their decision is not known. Regardless of this, the decision was not made to best benefit the students. If decisions are made that do not concentrate on the best interests of the students; what is the purpose of education?



While the rest of us were home for the Holidays, coaches Grimes and Jones took their teams on the road.

Let's start with the women's team. On the last weekend of 1993, coach Jones took her team to Brusha College in Kentucky and they returned to Marian with the tournament's first place trophy. That win was followed up by another one against Taylor. Sohpomore Leslie Wade, who leads the Mid Central Conference in scoring with an average of over 21 points per game, racked up 34 points and freshman Julie Jones added 13 to the winning cause.

Then came a loss to Indiana Wesleyan despite a 28 point night by Wade. Senior Judy Cenova put up 11 points and took down 12 rebounds. Along with leading the conference in scoring, Wade is ranked 16th in the country. Sophomore guard Lori James is presently 11th in the country with an average of over 5 assists per contest.

The Lady Knights dropped the next game to Goshen with Wade scoring 15 and ••

Junior Becky MacRae 10 and ended up the break with a 77 - 72 win over Grace.

The men's team also brought home a tournament trophy while we were at home. On December 30, they 14th ranked men's team won the Danville Tournament behined sophomore Alan Bush's 24 point title game against Taylor. Next coach Grimes and his team faced Saint Joseph college. Bush scored 20 and Junior Todd Wilson grabbed 13 boards in the loss to the Pumas.

I. U. East fell victim to Marian due to big perfromances by Senior Matt Pinnick, who scored 25 points and handed out 9 assists, Wilson's 26 points and 11 rebounds and Bush's 18 points. Goshen shut down the Knights this past weekend 86 - 73.

Along with being ranked 14th in the U. S. as a team, the Knights are also second in total defense and fifth in total rebounds. Bush's freethrow percentage ranks him fifth in the country.

Tired of tempura chicken, corn O'Brian, and whipped potatoes with bright yellow gravy? If the answer is yes, I suggest dining out at a lively place that serves great food at reasonable prices and a fantastic atmosphere. Sound too good to be true? It just so happens that Chili's Bar and Grill offers the very relief that you seek.

Chili's has three locations around the Indianapolis area. It is located at 38th Street past 465 (close to Marian!!), Clearwater Crossing on 82nd street, and Village Park Plaza on 31 in Westfield.

Chili's has a southwestern-style menu featuring such greats as fajitas, chicken tacos, BBQ baby-back ribs, and a variety of fabulous burgers. Henry Beck, director of Campus Ministry here at Marian and he replied that campus ministry is "a core community of interested people who try to reach the wider community through various activities", either on or off campus. These activities include retreats, faith-sharing groups, and housing repair to name a few. It's a gathering of people who want to spread faith into the wider community. These people are students, faculty and staff of all denominations here at Marian. Sometimes their activities take the group throughout Indianapolis, but the roots of campus ministry are at Marian.

Campus Ministry was started because of a need for a community of faith, and to be mindful of student, faculty and staff's faith needs. The purpose of campus ministry is to provide a faith community among young adults, and to provide leadership

activities. These leadership activities are prayer, social activities, outreach programs, and formation programs, such as RCIA and faith-sharing. One way group members can express leadership is through a core group of leaders called the pastoral team. This group is made up of eleven student and faculty members, and usually the members are the people in charge of organizing activities.


