Accurate calculations reveal that the average grade point for members of this year's basketball team is slightly over 1.7. Such an achievement deserves even greater notice when one considers the fact that these fellows put in a minimum of 12 hours every week for 5 months in play and practice.

Participation in athletics not only takes up time and energy which could be devoted to study, but it also makes it virtually impossible to earn much money in part time work. Yet this group of mon is able to stay in school and maintain a B- average collectively in spite of the handicap. And this is a serious handicap. It is an established fact that certain former Marian students who showed promise both athletically and academically had to drop out of school because of insufficient funds.

Intercollegiate athletics is an important and worthwhile part of college life. It is perhaps the most effective way of publicizing our school. I feel that our athletes should be given some kind of special consideration since they are engaged in such an important yet time and energy consuming activity.

In view of this, I think that a policy of granting a limited number of scholarships to deserving athletes should be adopted at Marian. I believe that athletic ability as well as academic ability and financial need should be used as criteria in making selections.

Considering the facts mentioned in the 1st paragraph, I do believe that the academic standards of the college would necessarily be lowered by such a move. As far as financial burden is concerned, it seems to me that it would merely be a matter of a few more students in classes who wouldn't be there otherwise. Also, I feel that the school could find some willing contributors to an athletic scholarship if such a fund existed.
