



## Student Board Budget 1965-1965

At the beginning of every semester each student is required to pay a \$10.00 Student Association Activity Fee as a part of their standard tuition and fees. This fee is turned over to the Student Board for appropriation to the publications, the classes, clubs and Board projects. Traditionally, the Board allots \$4.00 per student to the Marian (yearbook), one dollar to the Phoenix and one dollar to the Fioretti. Each class is entitled to \$1.00 per class member as class dues. In addition, the Board helps the various clubs with their national convention expenses and other in incidentals that enable them to realize their full potential.

The following is the first semester's fee computed at \$10.00 each for an estimated 735 students. These appropriations were discussed and passed at the regular Board meeting Wednesday evening.

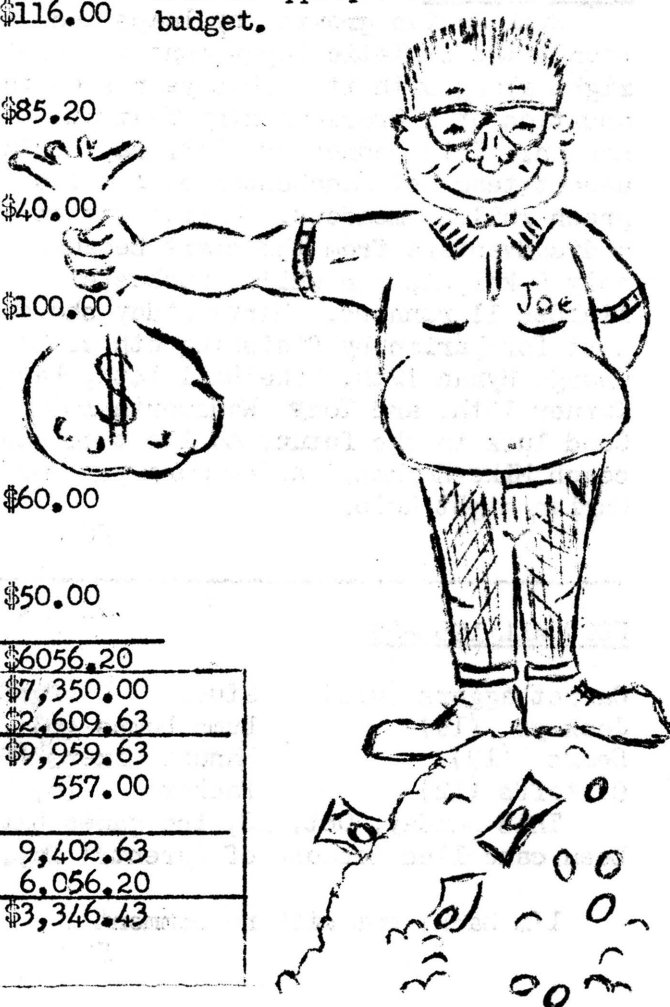

### NF OR NOT

The dilemma concerning the NFCCS is the question of NF versus United States National Student Association. As it stands, for the past five years Maria has maintained a stagnant existence in NF at an overwhelming expense—50¢ per student. This year NF has asked for \$800, more than twice the amount requested by any other nationally affiliated association on campus. This fee includes national and regional dues, and a part of the national convention fees; for this, we receive one vote at the national conference and access to all NF publication services.

This year we have the blessing of a dynamic campus NF leader and an ambitious national president. The question at hand is how much of the tremendous improvement is due to the personal ambition of Andy Wagner and how much to NF? The evidence seems to point to the former. Furthermore, what insurance do we have that in the future years when these two leaders are gone we will not fall back into the same inert state on campus and nationally that we have formally seen from NF?

On the other side is USNSA. National dues for this organization would be \$33.00 and regional dues approximately \$14.00. In addition to this, any service we request from NSA would be on a pay-as-you-go basis. In the long run it would be an appreciably smaller amount. Its national and international affiliations are much more extensive than that of NF. There are many advantages such as student exchange programs, student insurance plans, and travel agency provisions that NSA offers to member colleges that NF cannot provide. We would likewise have a voice at this association's national conference.

Questioned is whether the NF secretariat and delegates could not as effectively or more effectively concentrate their efforts through NSA rather than NF and produce the same or better results.

This problem has been left for the research and personal evaluation of each Student Board member until a special meeting to be held Wednesday, Oct. 21. There are three possible decisions: (1) retain our membership in NFCCS for another year and observe NSA; (2) drop NF and join NSA; or (3) join both organizations on an equal trial basis.

### The Presidential Election Spending Deficits and Big Government

The focal point of the Republican attacks will center on spending, deficits and "Big Government." Eisenhower used these issues successfully in 1952. To blunt this attack Johnson successfully halted the rise in Federal spending in January and even proposed a small reduction. Despite this feat, spending in 1964 was running at a level of 98 billion, compared with 80 billion when the Democrats took office. The Republicans charge that the Administration is the first to have a "planned deficit" in peacetime though such a move has strong support among economists.

Finally there will be the traditional charge of "Big Government!" The "War on Poverty" may not arouse many traditional fears of excessive influence by Washington over what are deemed by many essentially state and local and private responsibilities.
