

## NEW LIBRARY POLICIES



Over the summer the library instituted several new policies that will remain during this school year. The first is that anyone leaving the library will be required to show the circulation desk attendant their books and backpack.

Also this year, reserve materials may be checked out one half hour before the library closes but they must be returned by 9:30 A.M. the next morning (2:00 P.M. on Sundays). If they are not returned by this time the borrower will be charged \$1.00 per item per

hour that they are overdue. The regular fine is now 10¢ per item per day. If you have any materials overdue you may not borrow any material or use items on reserve until the fine has been paid. Transcripts, grades and diplomas will also be withheld.

## DIETETIC TECHNOLOGY

A new program in Dietetic Technology has started at Marian Colleg this Fall semester. This Dietetic technician program will be the first and only program targeted for a nutrition care emphasis versus the food service management emphasis presently offered by the two other dietetic technician programs in the state. Marian's program is designed to specifically educate the student to deliver patient care services in a marketplace demanding these services due to new health care regulations.

Dietetic technicians may pursue one of two avenues or emphasis in completing the American Dietetic Association approved program. The two emphasis are Food Service Management and Nutritional Care. Marian's proposed program will provide four semesters including the required 450 clock hours of clinical practice for a person following Dietetic Technician-Nutritional Care emphasis. Courses for this program will ladder into the established Bachelor's degree program in dietetics for those students wishing to continue.

The market for persons entering the fields of dietetics is quite positive. Jobs for dietetic technicians and dietitians are expanding even under new regulations on the health care industry. The Indianapolis area, in particular, is anticipating a growth of jobs in this field.

The dietetic technician program is a way for individual to gain academic

standing and preparation for a career and then work for experience and pay while pursuing further career or educational goals. For further information contact: Cathy Strain

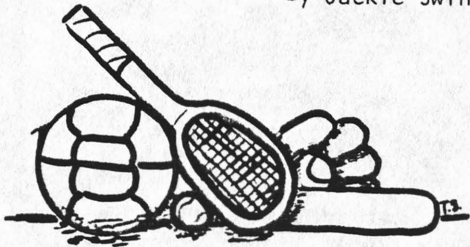

Broad Ripple features the Light Band...

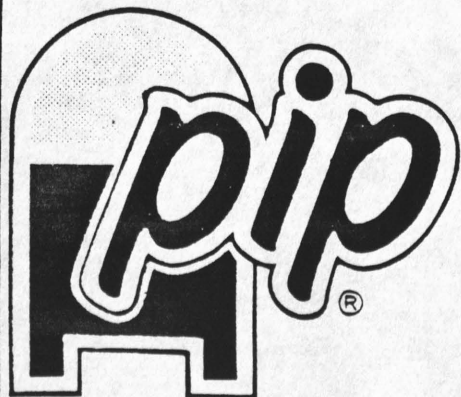
...For the under 21 crowd and
