CHRISTMAS WISH OR CHRISTMAS DREAM

Not sure whether I am wishing or dreaming for Christmas, I submit these thoughts to you as they seem fit.

May Santa get stuck in your chimney or locked in the boiler room of your large department store. I care not whether he be traditional white or newly painted black.

May you never give a gift and receive even less. And may every statue of the baby Jesus fall from your hands and break. For He ain't a baby no more. And He ain't gonna be one again.

May we forsake the butcher, the baker, the candle stick maker, and liquor store owner: flee the seller of mink and smelly water called perfume: scorn the suits and the big cars. The economy-- as they say might suffer, but there may be a new lease on human life.

May we not become false comforter of those in travail. Deluding ourselves that that's the Christmas Spirit. Acknowledging our blessings and thanking God for the same is one thing. Pretending that such realities as oppression, injustice, exploitation, suppression of thought, war, poverty and misery, automatically disappear (as long as I'm not the victim) at Christmas time is something else.

So let's search the soul and search the Scriptures. Around the Christmas feast we say we celebrate while making happy merchants' lots. Let's deal with such questions as who am I, and who are we? What is being Christian now in relation to people, places or situations where I do not live, or work, or play, or associate with or share--especially due to my own deliberate choice, direct or indirect?

Does being a Christian mean or add or qualify anything as far as my life and activities are concerned? Does it really make a difference? At the Celebration of Catholics during the season, Catholics will pray as always "deliver us, Lord from every evil and grant us peace in our day. In your mercy keep us free from sin and protect us from all anxiety as we wait in joyful hope for the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ."

That's my wish this Christmas provided we understand that 'waiting' is not equivalent to sitting on our fannies but working hard for that Advent-the Advent of the Lord.

Have the courage to make the same choice Jesus made, and suffer the consequences all well-including death and resurrection.

FR. JOSEPH DOOLEY

"I found teaching to be the most stimulating and rewarding experience in my life and I anticipate missing this greatly," related Fr. Joseph Dooley, Instructor of Theology.

Father has requested laicization and will no longer be able to participate in teaching at Marian. Unsure of his future plans, Father added that he was "confident that I will know in a few months.'

Fr. Dooley joined Marian's faculty in 1961 as Dean of Men, Instructor of Psychology, and taught Asian Religions. From '63 to '65 he held the title of Dean of Student Personnell (Dean of Student Services). In '65 he studied Asian Religions and Cultures at the University

of Iowa towards his Doctorate. Father returned to Marian in taught theology.

During his teaching career, Fr. Dooley has received various fellowships from the Non-Western Studies Project of Indiana and the Indiana Consortium for International Studies. He also was granted the Faculty Fellowship for Study of Sanskrit (language for classical literature of India), a summer study, from the University of Wisconsin.

Highlighting Father Dooley's 12 Years at Marian were his involvement in the planning of the first wing of Doyle Hall, in the decision-making to have the first lay Dean of Student Personnel, and in the planning and development of programs for both the psychology and theology major and minor. Father Dooley not only initiated the Faculty Speakers Bureau in 1962 but inaugurated a fiveyear faculty seminar in theology which lasted till 1970. The seminar was designed to introduce faculty members to post Vatican II theological thought.

Fr. Dooley has taught many theology classes at Marian, but he will be remembered most for Asian Religions, Phenomenology, Christian Morality, and Honors Theology.

Besides his duties at Marian, Father also has assisted at St. Thomas Acquinas Church and served as their Director of Religious Education.

Students are sure to miss the friendliness and dedication of Fr. Joseph Dooley.

After 17 years as Director of Financial Aid, Miss Patricia Jeffers will terminate her post with Marian College and assume similiar responsibilities with Ohio Dominican College.

Miss Jeffers enrolled as a student at Marian in the Fall of '56. Prior to this she had taken correspondence classes from the University of Ottawa (Canada) Miss Jeffers explained that "it was Fr. Joseph Dooley who encouraged me to seek a college diploma.

Working in the Registrar's Office as a student for one year, Miss Jeffers stayed on to work there upon graduation. In September of '64, Marian opened the Admission's Office and Miss Jeffers was named the first director. Then in March of '69 she became the second Director of Financial Aid.

Miss Jeffers was born in Indpls., but grew up in Terre Haute. She received her B.A. from Marian in 1959 with a major in philosophy and a minor in history. Since then, Miss Jeffers has spent nine summers doing graduate work at the University of Ottawa.

During her stay at Marian, Miss Jeffers has opened her home to students with financial problems. She has had foreign students from Bolevia, Polland, and Hong Kong as well as American students stay with

Miss Jeffers, aside from her responsibilities of Financial Aid, likes to travel. She has toured Central America twice, Europe, and Alaska.

To some students, Miss Jeffers will be remembered for helping them obtain financial aid, but to most of the college community she will be remembered as "Pat."

One of the most interesting happenings on Marian's campus occurs every Tuesday and Thrusday night when Felix Wong meets with his Kung-fu class.

The class began in September and since then Felix has been teaching his students the basic techniques and warm-up exercises needed for the beginning student in Kung-fu.

Kung-fu originated in China, developed by monks who because of their isolation, felt the need for some kind of defense against bandits. These monks noticed the various movements of animals and incorporated these movements, both quick and graceful, into their art of self-defense.

Felix's knowledge of Kung-fu comes from five years of study in Hong Kong under the instruction of a Kung-fu master. Probably the most important tennat of Felix's instruction was that spiritual power can defeat physical power. A great deal of meditation and selfdiscipline is required to achieve even a small portion of this inward power.

When asked if his knowledge of Kung-fu has helped him in trouble, Felix replied, "The knowledge of Kung-fu helps to avoid trouble. In Kung-fu you learn that your body can be a fearsome weapon, but also you learn self discipline, so when you are provoked you have the greater power that allows you to calmly walk away."
