KNIGHTS TAKE TWO, THEN BOW TO INDIANA CENTRAL

Sporting a record of two wins, four losses, and two ties, the Knights took the field against Earlham last Saturday and shelled four pitchers from the mound in sweeping both ends of a doubleheader, 11-1, and 2-0. Rudy Jansen, the starting pitcher in the opener, went all the way and allowed only one run during seven innings of fine hurling. Jerry Williams then took to the mound and likewise turned ina sparkling performance, pitching seven innings of scoreless ball to blank Earlham, 2-0. Both pitchers were supported by a crew which was nearly flawless in the field and vicious at the plate.

The error bugaboo finally caught the Kmights Wednesday afternoon against Indiana Central as a rash of costly overthrows and miscues erased a 5-0 Marian lead in the top of the third. The Greyhounds drove run after run across the plate as Marian loaded the bases twice with none out and failed to tally. They finally left the field on the short end of a 15-5 score.

The Knights record now stands at 4-5-2, and we are confident that they will improve on this in the remaining games.

LINKSMEN PLACE HIGH

In the Indiana small-college golf meet held at Muncie last Friday, the golf team placed twelfth ina field of 20 sharp-shooting teams. The Knights were only 57 strokes off the winning pace or 5½ stokes per man per round. Among the independent colleges, the linksmen placed sixth in a field of eleven teams. Their record now stands at three wins and five losses, but with Bill Murphy and louie Firsich hitting the ball the way they have been recently, Marian looks forward to whipping Concordia in their next match at Riverside.
