THE VOICE OF "MASS APPEAL"

"...a voice to cry out." Something not everyone has. But, for those of us who do, we need to use it from time to time--for ourselves, for others, for our beliefs.

Perhaps this is the message of "Mass Appeal", a play written by Bill C. Davis, which returned to Marian November 24 at the request of Sister Stella Gampfer, Associate Professor of English. The play centers on the injustice a young seminarian, Mark Dolson (played by Harvey Fries), faces over his past. An older priest, Father Tim Farley (played dynamically by Jim Shildmyer) acts as Mark's mentor. Father Tim struggles to find a voice to cry out in Mark's behalf. Many times though, the play sadly--but realistically--points out, self-interest inhibits our crying out for another. To overcome self-interest is indeed heroic as well as freeing. Father Tim achieves such a triumph and the audience is left with the hope that Mark, too, will be victorious.

The actors and director, Mike Shildmyer, are using the play as their voice to cry out. All proceeds of every performance go to the Benedictine Missions in African countries to feed the starving.

Following the performance, the cast joined Sister Stella, Dr. James Goebel, Dr. Ray Craig, and Father Leopold for a reception in the English Department. Harvey Fries commented that Sunday's performance was the thirteenth time he had portrayed Mark Dolson and said that repetition can be challenging. To counter this challenge, Harvey said he likes to be "a little out of control" each time in order to bring spontaneity to every performance.

As for the future, the actors and director are eager to offer the play to any organization who can supply a stage--or anything resembling. Once, the actors performed outdoors on the foundation of a new chapel. "We'll continue as long as people ask us," Mike commented. REVITALIZATION OR DEATH?

Has anyone noticed a problem? Don't look too far; it's under your nose. The Carbon is failing. The staff has dwindled; its pool of talent evaporating. As a result the quality of the paper has declined severely over the years.

In the 1970's Marian College proudly printed two student publications, The Carbon and the Phoenix. The Carbon was originally printed as a report of student board actions, school events and time schedules.

The Phoenix was a top quality school newspaper with interviews, editorials, reviews, photos, cartoons, and more--all presented in true newspaper form. The papers were controversial, insightful, humorous, and entertaining.

Beginning in the mid-1970's and continuing until today, student interest in the publications declined. Eventually the Phoenix went out of print altogether (and, incidentally, the yearbook was no longer published with any regularity). The Carbon was at times reduced to a one sheet obligatory bulletin.

Last year, when it became apparent that the paper would end altogether without immediate reinforcement, Dr. Ray Craig

volunteered to act as advisor to the staff. Some immediate improvements resulted. Under Dr. Craig's guidance, the format and print were improved, cartoons and wire service articles were added, and an overall commitment to revitalization was made.

All this proved to be only a superficial change, however. The real problems are a lack of active staff members, a lack of student interest, a lack of ideas.

That a college of 1000 students isn't publishing a top-quality student newspaper is disgraceful. It is a very poor reflection on the institution and its students.

Now I appeal to the student body. Among 1000 students, there must be a dozen people interested in helping in small ways to build a good student paper. No one is demanding English majors, novelists or poets. The Carbon needs students with ideas, students who can work with the ideas of others, students willing to help a couple of hours each week. If you are expecting some important first class mail, which you wish forwarded, please notify the mail room personnel before you leave for the holidays.

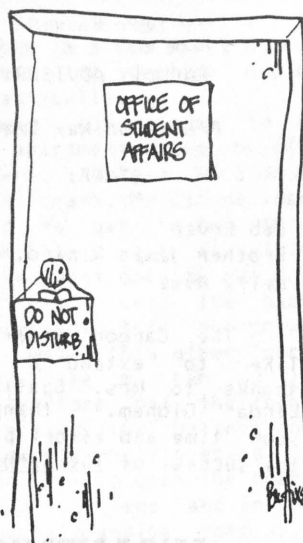
