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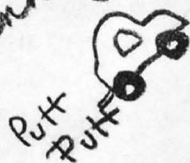

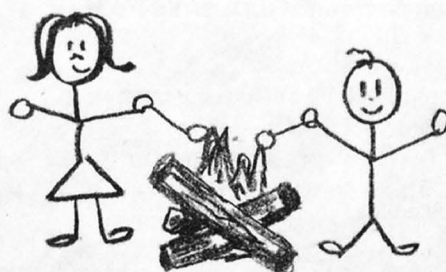

NEWS

Polish Party Chief Replaced—After the resolution of the Polish labor strike last week, the Polish Communist Party's Central Committee chose Stanislaw Kania to replace party chief Edward Gierek who is allegedly suffering from "serious" heart trouble. Gierek had been thought to be in political trouble by the concessions made to the Polish strikers, including an independent trade union for the workers and resulting in the dismissal/resignation of nearly half the party's executive committee. Kania, who has worked within the party since 1945 but has no government experience, is expected to merely preserve the 'status quo'. It is suspected that he may try to compromise the concessions made by Gierek.

Inflation—Wholesale food prices rose 4.4% in August, increasing the annual rate of the Producers Price Index to 20%.

The national unemployment rate, however, dropped 0.2% from 7.8 to 7.6 in the month of August. This is an indication that the "economic slump may be ending soon," according to a spokesman for the Department of Labor.

Major banks in the country raised the Prime Interest Rate from 11.5% to 12%, the highest since June.

Libya-Syria Merger—Calling for "Arab unity," the governments of Libya and Syria announced plans for a merger of the two countries last week. Libyan leader Col. Muammar Khadafy said the unity was directed "against Zionism and imperialism" and against Egypt's President Anwar Sadat who had "stopped fighting Israel because he was conforming to American orders".

The success of the merger is skeptical observing that Syria and Libya have no common border and noting that several attempts by Khadafy for Arab unity through mergers have failed in the past.

Carter Declines Debates—A spokesman for President Carter said Carter is prepared to debate "any and all candidates" on the condition that "Gov. Reagan will first meet the President in a one-on-one debate," declining to participate in the 3-way debate as scheduled by the League of Women Voters. The announcement came shortly after the organization invited Rep. John Anderson to participate.

Reagan has been offered 3 other opportunities for 2-man debates with Carter and has refused each of them. Reagan has said that Carter's agreeing to a 3-man debate would preclude any chance for a head-on debate between himself and the President.

The League of Women Voters is preparing to go ahead with the initial debate on September 21st with or without Carter.

BE RESPONSIBLE

One of the most serious problems in American political life today is that of the high instance of nonvoting. Despite recent extensions of suffrage to 18-year-olds and lowering of residence and other requirements for registration, despite higher educational levels and easier access to information on candidates and issues, the percentage of eligible voters who do in fact vote decreases with each election. The problem is serious because it means that, whether they are aware of it or not, nonvoters are putting more power into the hands of a few well-organized, well-funded pressure groups representing narrow and selfish interests rather than the public good. If many Americans today are "fed up" with the present party system and current presidential candidates, it may well be that the apathy, cynicism, or just plain laziness of nonvoters are behind the defects in the system and candidates they're complaining about.

There really isn't any good reason for failure to vote among eligible Marian College students. Nearly all students fulfill eligibility requirements somewhere, and registration procedures are simple. If you will have lived in the same residence 30 days before Election Day, November 4, 1980, you can register to vote in that precinct. In other words, if you're living on campus, you can register to vote now. For the convenience of Indianapolis (Marion County) residents, I will be available to register voters at the History/Political Science table at the Shopper's Fair, September 16, and I will also answer any questions you might have about registration and voting procedures. If you are already registered in another county or state, check with your county election board (ordinarily in the County Clerk's office at your County Court House) to get an absentee ballot, and do that soon.

If your fears about voting are that you're not acquainted with the issues and candidates, why not begin now reading the newspapers and/or watching TV news (with a critical eye, of course)? Try the first floor of the library. If you're really interested, there are two additional ways of becoming informed. First, there are a number of campaigners for various candidates and parties among the Marian students this year. If you haven't spotted them yet, they will probably make their presence known to you very soon. Take advantage of these political activists; they'll assist you even if you don't agree with their political viewpoints. Second, plan to attend, if you can, the IMPACT VII, Election '80 workshop here on campus, Saturday, September 27. (See notice on the main bulletin board and in this issue of the CARBON). Major features of this workshop will be examinations of voting records of Indiana Congressional candidates and comparisons of platforms of the presidential candidates, including John Anderson.

But, above all, register to vote this year; it's a right and a privilege you can't afford to pass up.

Turkey Military Takes Command of Government—Turkey, a country of extreme strategic importance to the U.S., was overtaken by the military in a bloodless coup Thursday. The object was to oust a government allegedly preoccupied with partisan bickering rather than the national problems of 130% inflation rate and a 20% unemployment.

Bordering on the Soviet Union, Turkey is the site of several U.S. 'listening posts' used to observe Soviet activities along the Black Sea. A new defense cooperation agreement was signed by the U.S. and Turkey last March.

The Turkish military has twice before intervened in government politics. In each case, civilian rule was re-established relatively quick.

AN INTERVIEW WITH DEBORAH BHAGWANDIN

Deborah S. Bhagwandin, the new Clare Hall Director was born, raised, and educated in the Racing Capitol of the world- Indianapolis, Indiana. She had her grade school education at St. John's Lutheran school and later graduated from Franklin Central High School. She entered the prestigious Butler University in August of 1976 and graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Secondary Education on May 18th, 1980.

During her college days at Butler, Ms. Bhagwandin had served as a Student Counselor, Sorority Chaplin and Student Assembly Representative. She was also very active in organizing and conducting different activities on campus. Ms. Bhagwandin had coordinated different Spring Weekend activities at Butler, organized weekly events on campus and served as an all-campus Events Committee Volunteer and also as a Faculty Evaluation Worker.

With all these college activities experiences, she never neglected her educational experiences. During her college days, she served as a Day Camp Counselor, was a student teacher in both high and junior high schools. She also had worked as a State Police General Student Assistant and tutored at Tech High School.

Academically, Ms. Bhagwandin, apart from hitting the Dean's List, served as Vice-President of Kappa-Delta Pi, And on the day of graduation, received the Phi-Delta-Kappa award.

I asked almost the same questions as I did last week to Dan Remley and she seemed to be agreeing with her counterpart.

What was your first impression of Marian College?

I liked it alot because it is a small college that is secluded and orderly. I like the idea of Clare Hall being in the center of everything- easy access to the administration building and other important places on campus. All in all, it's a pretty campus mixed with beautiful old buildings like Allison and solid modern buildings beautified by green trees and grass lawns.

Don't you think that the alcohol rule should be released?

It could be released for college dances, Parents Weekend and other functions of the like on campus.

Do you feel that you are breathing a conservative air on this campus?

Yes, but I am used to it. Butler is something like here.

What do you think of the idea of open visitation?

I am not for it. 24 hour visitation could infringe on others privacy. However, I do think that visitation hours could be relaxed-6 p.m. on weekdays to midnight. Weekend hours are good as they are.

How's your relationship with your superiors here?

It's positive. I feel very well received. If I need anything done, they are willing. I like the kind of open-door policy.

How's your relationship with the students at Clare?

I feel good. We have a super R.A. staff and I have had no problems yet.

How do you feel about the relationships among students at Clare?

It seems pretty good. They seem friendly and helpful to each other. However, I feel that the relationship with Marian girls and ELS girls could be better.

Do you see the need for any type of change

Well, I would like to see more programming. Lisa Mailloux, the president of Clare Hall Board has alot of ideas and we are planning in that direction. I personally would like to see more educational programs.

Any expectations before you came here? Or any disappointments after?

I thought it would be a continuation of Butler, but it was not. I thought it would be a close-knit school, which it is. I enjoy it. I also thought it would have a national flavor among the students, but most of the students seem to be from Indiana. I like the international students mingling in the population. I think the ELS program has a lot to do with it, which is good.

Ms. Bhagwandin is also working on her Masters in Student Personnel at IUPUI and hopes to climb to the top of the Student Personnel Ladder sometime. We wish you all the best and continued happiness in the work you have undertaken at Marian.

I am a Day Student and recently received a
