This season should be really exciting. The fast-pace play will be fun to watch and hopefully everyone will get out to catch the action.

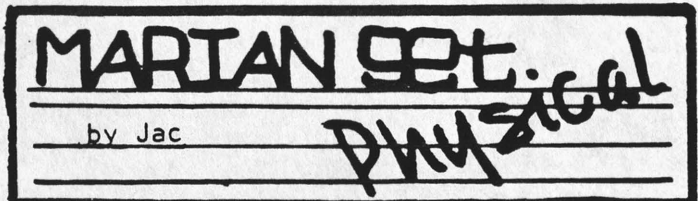

-Psychodrama?-

What is Psychodrama? The Psychology Club is sponsoring an event on Wednesday, November 14 at 8:30 p.m. (in the Library Auditorium) that will give you the opportunity to find out.

Psychodrama allows a client to work out important self issues through role-playing techniques. So yes, it is a form of theater.

Since the client is role-playing, there is a greater freedom to express true feelings. It also allows the patient to resolve issues or unfinished business with other persons that may not be available. Sometimes the person role-playing may be asked to switch roles, and someone else will take the client's place. This forces the client to observe how others perceive his/her speech and body language.

It can be an extremely intense form of therapy, but that's okay since the client has the support of the therapist and other group members. Even the audience benefits, as they get caught up in the experience.

The performers are called the "Picture This" players, and most of them are staff members at Community Hospital. Their role-plays come from their own experiences in dealing with psychiatric patients. They formed their group in an effort to bring public awareness to the Mental Health Field.

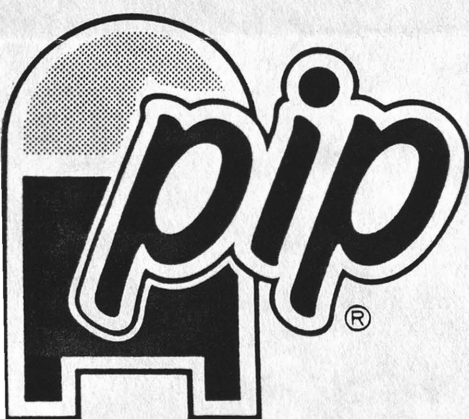

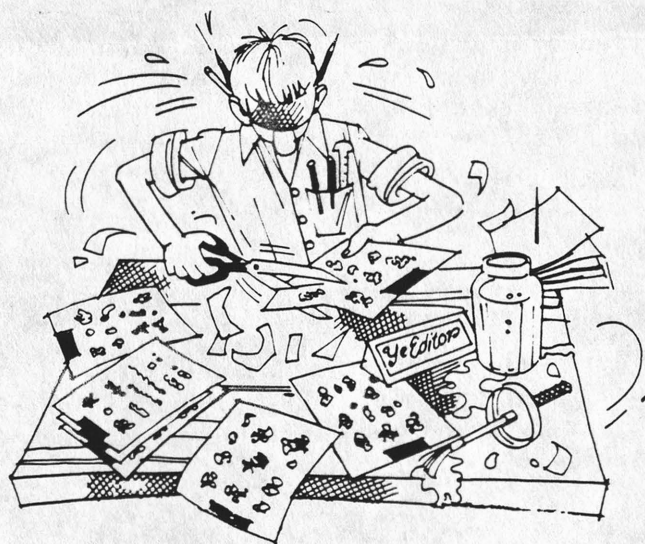
