CORRECTION.....

Last week copies were circulated of a petition regarding Madalyn Murray O'Hair's purported efforts to eliminate religious programming on the airways. Individuals who were opposed to her proposal were encouraged to send notice of their disapproval to the Federal Communications Commission. It was brought to our attention by reputable people that the Federal Communications Commission had been contacted and that they have no record of any such efforts by Mrs. O'Hair. The Commission has requested that the petitions of protest not be sent. We therefore suggest that the petition be discarded. It seems that many, many people throughout the country were genuinely distressed by the rumored proposal which, happily, is untrue. We were pleased that many of the Marian community also expressed interest in this cause, (continued on top of next column)

and we hope that they will continue to be "concerned citizens" in the future. Next time we will do a more careful check on the initial information.

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U. S. POLICY AND HUMAN RIGHTS

A very illuminating account of what's going on in Korea today was given by Rev. Fr. Jim Sinnott a Maryknoll Missionary, who lived and worked in the Korean Missions for over fifteen years. Yesterday's speech culminated with a very moving film about what the people in Korea, especially the Christians are undergoing beneath the dictatorship nursed and nurtured by a powerful western power.

From his college days on, Fr. Sinnott wanted to be a simple missionary carrying the cross and words of Christ. "Governments come and go, but Christ was then, is now, and will be always" he says. During his stay in Korea, he did whatever he could to help the needy, especially the sick. His successful venture in building a small hospital, hiring a doctor to work and he, himself, with a fore-medical college knowledge, working with the doctor to attend to the bodily sickness of the people speaks highly of his dedication to the simple mission life. "I never wanted to think of the politics going in and around there," he says.

It is only after his arrest in 1974 while he was praying on a lawn and later expelled from Korea, that he began to think of the Politics and Power that does hover around most countries of this nature. When asked whether the Church should enter politics, he felt that "if the people come to us for help, we have to help in whatever way we can. This does not mean taking to guns." He feels the pastors in Korea are determined to go through whatever persecutions to uphold the Cross. "We don't like to go to jail, but we will if we have to" seems to be the height of their zeal. Fr. Sinnott concluded in a very happy note saying, "people aren't sad when they accept it as the will of God and are braving it." We wish Fr. Sinnott many more happy years of good work wherever he goes from here.

GRADUATING SENIORS

Seniors may pick up their free copy of the Marian College "Employment Bulletin" each Friday at the Placement & Career Advising Office, Room 108 Marian Hall. The "Employment Bulletin" is a compilation of all employment openings listed with the Placement Office during the preceding week. Only a limited number of copies will be available, and are on a first-come - first serve basis.

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FROM THE PLACEMENT OFFICE

The job outlook for 1978-79 grads remains bright, despite forecasts of possible recession and economic pessimism. More companies are sending recruiters to college campuses, resulting in more job offers to students.

According to a report released by the College Placement Council, recruiting will be up about 25 percent over last year. Similiar studies by Endicott and Michigan State report the same trends. Endicott reports that employers will hire 18 percent more bachelor's graduates and 11 percent more master's graduates.

Areas of greatest demand appear to be in the fields of engineering, business, marketing, economics, accounting, and computer specialists. Job opportunities in government and education will continue to decline.

Starting salaries for '79 graduates are expected to rise by 4 to 9 percent overall. Largest salary increases are being offered in the high-demand fields of engineering, chemistry, computer science and business. The Eddicott Report figures show the following average monthly salaries for 1979 bachelor's students (compared with 1978 averages): Engineering - \$1524 (\$1431). . . Chemistry - \$1318 (\$1253). . . Computer Science - \$1286 (\$1200). . . Math/Statistics - \$1250 (\$1156) Accounting - \$1229 (\$1166). . . Business Administration - \$1122 (\$1043). . . Sales and Marketing - \$1091 (\$1035)... Economics and Finance - \$1089 (\$1034) . . . Liberal Arts - \$1062 (\$996) . . . Other Fields - \$1213 (\$1130).

2. Although we decided the quality and contents of the salad bar were very good, we felt that it should be moved. At this point we were unable to decide where to put it.
3. We looked over a three week menu and suggested some changes. Those changes were immediately made.
