In the fight for women's self-regulated hours several years ago, the rights of a minority segment of Clare Hall women were baragained away to insure speedy approval of self-regulated hours for the majority. Therefore Marian was left with one remaining vestige of descrimination against women- Freshmen women's hours.

The argument presented with the first self-regulated hours proposal for women was that women are just as mature and responsible as men, and since there should be no hours for Doyle Hall, there should be none for Clare Hall women. I believe this argument is still valid.

Then why do Frehmen women still have hours? It seems the institution still clings to the patronizing attitude that their weak and defensiess "girls" (why not the boys?) still need someone to play parent for them and make sure they don't stay out to late. What puzzles me is why Freshmen women passively accept this demeaning and inferior position. Maybe they are unaware that there are ways of thying to remedy this situation. If that's the case I hope they approach Clare Hall Board to do something - because it can be changed. But why has Clare Hall Board been negligent in instigating action on this matter itself.? I would think the policy would be demeaning to every Clare Hall women in every class for isn't it the implication that the Sophomore women are only as mature and reponsible as Frosh men, Juniors as Sophpmore, and so on up the line?

In this day and age I don't believe the right of women to be treated as equals to men can be challenged. The college should have the same confidence in the maturity of Freshmen women as they do the men. On the other hand if Clare Hall residents want to be treated as the responsible women they are, they must assert their right to this and stop submitting to the inferior role assigned to them by the hours policy.

Farah Boycott

Despite the publicity given to the struggle of Chicano farmworkers for the rights and dignity, the overwhelming majority of Chicanos who can find work hold jobs as unskilled or semi-skilled workers - and they are facing

the same struggle.

The Farah Manufacturing Company has been exploiting Mexican-American labor and opposing all attempts by them to organize unions. In May, leading union activists were arbitrarly fired, and 3,000 Farah workers walked off the job. Farah tried to break the struggle by importing workers from Mexico. They also arrested 800 strikers despite the fact that there has been no violence on the striker's part. The Federal Government has found that Farah Company is guilty of unfair labor paractices for firing union sympathizers however the company continues to flant the law - within a month after the strike was declared, 24 union supporters were fired in Victoria, Texas.

The Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America supported by the Citizens Committee for Justice for Farah Workers has launched a nationwide boycott of Farah pants. They are appealing to students to support the boycott since the students are a major segment of the Farah

jeans consumers.




