

The Marian College Student Board met this past fonday evening in the Men's Lounge. Nancy Carrier presided over her first meeting as President, precipitated by the resignation of Andy Wagner. 'his reporter was present at the press conference which followed the meeting and was impressed with the President's unevasive, frank answers of all juestions presented.

The number one item on the agenda was the falterng Welfare Program. The organization's president, students who take courses which require a text. linny Mosele, has vowed to do all in her power to get the program moving and obviously needs much cooperation from its members.
