Marian College made their debut at the Fifth Annual Mid-Anerican Undergraduate Psychology Research Conference, Saturday, April 12 at the University of Southern Indiana, Dr. Faye Plascak, Professor of Psychology, summed up the students' performance: 'I was 50 proud I could hardly stand it!"

Six Marian College seniors subnitted an abstract to the Conference Comnittee for evaluation and acceptance. All six abstracts were accepted and their authors inuited to participate in the Conference. This is an inpressive record for a first year showing.

The Conference is designed to offer undergraduates an experience of the depth of research required in graduate school. Also, the Conference seeks to credit and give merit to undergraduate research. Twenty schools were invited to attend, anong then Wabash, Hanover, Indiana Central, IUPUI, University of Kentucky, and Washington University. The six will present their senester's work during the week beginning April 28 in Psychology roon 014 Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. A complete schedule will be available by April 25. ## TO THE TROUBLE CAUSERS

The danage "trouble causers" bring about night be subtle and deep. In fact, if trouble is a breakdown of nornal procedures toward right goals, trouble causers are indeed bad, and it is proper that we devote a great deal of energy toward their renoval. The normal is what we want and need. We thrive when our goals are sound and there is as little interference as possible between us and their achievement.

Cholesterol in arteries is a trouble causer, and 50 is cancer, and high blood pressure and fanine, floods, fires, alarn clocks not going of $f$, corporations not extending living wages to enployees, cowardice when sone thina needs to be acted on, the loud nouth leading the lynch mob, and on and on. It's not hard to be clear about it. You identify the real goal one is trying to achieve: you note who and what contributes to its achievenent: and then you identify what's getting in the way--there's your trouble causer.

It seens obvious that there are trouble causers. But, a little thinking on the matter reveals sone obvious, though perhaps unexpected, distinctions that have to be made in order to effectively address the trouble. In this article, I want to call attention to three. They are as simple, obvious and serious-as nost true things are.

The first and nost obvious requirenent for returning situations to nornal in a state of trouble is correct diagnosis--accurate identification-of the cause, Not only history, but reflection on our present experience as well, reveals not only disputes in diagnosis (showing that identification of what the real cause is is not automatically obvious), but nany times that our diagnosis is dead wrong with plain stupid results. Inagine for a monent through history, the monentous figures whose achievenents we've cone to depend on who were considered to be
trouble causers, fron Socrates, Jesus, Galileo, through the founders of the labor unions, to the people who decided to publish the Pentagon Papers and Watergate materials. Then imagine the persons in prison who are innocent, the lynched young man, the ones with no publicity at all! And then, of course, there are those who judge congestive heart failure as indigestion, leukenia as nono, lack of self-esteen as behavioral problems, and the inability to do well in a course as being due to the demand to urite essay exans. And then the sickening responses when the collapse occurs: "Oh well, you know how it is," or, "Our hands are tied. Now, it's one thing to try as hard as you can to find the real cause and fail, and as I urite this, I'm not sure I would be very good at finding real causes of trouble. In fact, if I were good at that enterprise, I swear ny life would be shoother. But the fact renains--as clearly as events have causes-a failure to identify the correct cause not only fails to correct matters; it instead contributes, sonetines substantially, to the danage done. Many times with fatal results. This latter is a contribution one would not want to make.

A second critical insight to sound trouble shooting is the realization that proper corrective measures always require some unusual activity. This unusual activity has to be distinguished fron the trouble, and if it is challenged as the trouble, the corrective neasures will be crippled allowing the real trouble to advance. Consider the surgeon in relation to the tunor. Cut one's body open? I-V's? Chemotherapy with its sonetimes drastic side effects? We need to realize that this is highly unusual activity, and mark my word, there are people with tunors who refuse to see a doctor because they want to avoid the trouble the surgeon will cause. I personally witnessed a woman who attacked the fireman trying
to force open her house door to get at the source of smoke rolling out her windows. She said he was ruining her house. The firenan's activity was unusual to be sure, but her identification of his actions as the trouble was not what we consider a smart judgnent. Think about it. Corrective neasures in the face of trouble are nostly out-of-the-ordinary ones. They are necessary, we nust expect them; to take them as the trouble because of their imnediacy to our noses can contribute substantially to the trouble. It would behoove us all to take seriously the observation of Viktor Frankl that normal and good people do unusual things when they encounter the abnormal. In fact, isn't the person who is accepting of unfair practices a dangerous person? And people--normal people-will speak out and do whatever it takes to eliminate trouble.

The third and final realization that is necessary for effective trouble shooting is that in human projects the trouble never goes away without our participation--the participation of all involved in the achievenent of the goals. Hunan projects aren't like trees healing themselves where we can sleep through the correction. This is for sure what Edith Hanilton means when she points out that there are no safe havens for hunan beings. We must participate in the correction or it simply won't happen, and only when we do will there be safety and justice. If we sleep, and the correction requires our involvenent, we will contribute to the trouble causers.

The issue of the three sisters, Sr. UR, FM, and MP may seem of no major consequence to a nunber of people because its publicity isn't that of Watergate or the Philippines, but the character of the people involved is the same. The one who acts responsibly here would act responsibly there. And 50 too at their PTA, and in the rearing of their child, etc. Do you know what the cause of the trouble is? Are you confusing just any unusual activity with the real trouble? And are you doing something? Are you contributing to the trouble causers?

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## PRINCE U OFF

The year 1986 has been, and will continue to be, a critical year for many rock performers. Groups and performers such as Fleetwood Mac, the Stones, Bob Seger, Billy Idol, and Van Halen will be releasing, or have already released, albuns that will be carefully scrutinized by critics due to the fact that the performers have put out no new products in several years, especially in Fleetwood Mac's case! One performer, not mentioned above, whose new album will especially be closely looked at by critics and fans due to the relatively unsuccessful previous albun he released, is Pr ince.

Priace has been virtually a chameleon when it comes to music. On his first two albuns (1978's For You, 1979's Prince ) Prince was pretty out-of-focus although Mike Henderson likes to jan to "I Wanna Be Your Lover: On 1980's Dirty Mind, Prince elininated his chances of having any of the albun's funk-oriented dance tunes (on which, like his previous albuns, he played all the instrunents) because of explicit lyrics and controversial storylines dealing with 2\#! $\$$ *ex, in $\$ / \%$ \% , all-night partying, and achission that "everybody has a dirty mind." On 1981's Controversy , Prince continued the explicit lyrics although the songs started to becone more comnercial with the title song beconing a mild hit single that Sr . 01 ga likes to boogie to. Prince hit massive commercial success with 1982's 1999 and 1984's Purple Rain. With Purple Rain , Prince began to allow his stage band to play on the albuns and dubbed them The Revolution. Every song on the album, due to the novie and extensive airplay, becane great successes. The only song that had a hint of the old Prince was "Darling Hikki" with one "questionable" word that kept it fron being played on the radio. (If you want to know what that word is, ask Alonzo.)

However, on 1985's Around The World In A Day, Prince surprised fans with psychedelia and songs that almost sounded like gospel music! The lyrics were visionary as was the cover and fans just didn't know what to think.

Releasing the albun without much fanfare and no tour, Prince laid low for the year and fans waited.

Now, with the release of Parade the soundtrack for Prince's new novie, Lincer The Cherry Moon (to be released in the summer), Prince and The Revolution have nade their triumphant return! or have they?

Although fans who have liked Prince's nusic all along will undoubtedly get into the albun's funk and total orchestration, fans who liked the style of the songs on Purple Rain and the majority of 1999 will probably be disappointed. The albur opens with the psychedelic "Christopher Tracy's Parade" and on the funky dance tune "New Position," Prince sings, "Let's go fishing in the River/the River of Life" and "Honey, forget your past/U've got 2 try ny new funk." "I Wonder $U$ " is an interestingly done song that sounds as though all the sounds, except bass, are coning from computers. "Under The Cherry Moon" is a soft ballad and on "Girls \& Boys", Prince goes back to his rude-boy inage with the lyrics "She had the cutest *** I've ever seen." "Life Can Be So Nice" is another psychedelic song, talking about "scrambled eggs/and morning glory." A short orchestral instrumental, "Venus de Milo" closes out the first side. "Mountains", the albun's strongest track, opens the second side, with Prince singing falsetto. "Do U Lie?" has a French sound to it (hearkening to the upcoming movie). In the funky "Kiss", Prince sings falsetto again and "Anotherloverholenyohead" is a boring slow song with the lyrics " $U$ need another lover/like $U$ need a hole in your head " and some Hendrix imitation guitar playing at the song's end. The album closes with the slow ballad "Sometines It Snows In April", which should be Indy's theme song.

So, although hard-core Prince fans will probably jam to this new return-to-funk Prince music, others would probably rather spray gravy on the album. However, even if you don't like Prince, you should ask Dr. Craig to show you his Prince initation sometime. It's quite inspiring.
