

U.S. Invades Iraq



Tensions arose in the Middle East once again, when on Wednesday allied aircraft attacked missile batteries and radar sites in Southern Iraq. The strike consisted of warplanes from the United States, France and Britain. Recent violations of UN Security Council resolution 688, the gulf war cease-fire agreement, were the cause of the attack. This attack is just the latest in a series of recent events in this area, and it is not likely to be the last. President Bush assured his French and British allies that he will not waver on

his firm stance against Saddam
Hussein in the waning days of
his presidency. Many analysts
speculate that Saddam is trying
to take advantage of the transitional state of the american
government. However, President-elect Clinton was consulted
Wednesday and was indeed

supportive, promising to follow a strict policy concerning Iraq. As to whether any further action will be taken by the allies, according to White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater, "We will follow up as necessary."



The End of Sweet Spontaneous





The soundtrack for the film of the same title, Swindle carries other infamous names of the punk industry like Ten-Pole Tudor, and includes some of the Pistols solo works one being the cult classic "My Way" by Sid Vicious. 4. Neneh Cherry- Homebrew. This is the same chick who did Buffalo Stance, 'nuff said.

5.Tom Waits-Bone Machine.
Morbid lyrics, original music, interesting rythms and Tom's distinctive voice remind us that vaudeville is not dead. I must admit, I'm biased because I happen to believe that Tom Waits is the greatest musical genius since that Mozart guy, he is also one of the most under-rated, but so was Mozart.

6.Ice Cube- The Predator. The best of the hardcore rappers outdoes himself in this recording. Despite the fact that he does included a typically sexist groove titled "You Can't Trust 'em" reffering, of course, to women, Cube is still one

of the best lyricists of the rap scene. With "We Had to Tear This Motherf***er Up," about the L.A. riots, he reminds us what "By any means possible," can lead to. 7. Alternative Tentacles Compilation- Virus 100. 16 of the best alternative bands in the music industry covering songs of the greatest band in alternative music history namely. the Dead Kennedys.

8.Black 47- Black 47(EP).
