Stokely renovation set

In January 1990, the Music Department will vacate Stokely Mansion and move to Alverna Hall for that semester. During that time St. Margaret's Guild will renovate the mansion as its 1990 show house.

Each year St. Margaret's Guild chooses a show house to be restored by decorators who donate their work. The money that is made from the sale of admission tickets is donated to Winona Hospital.

Although the Guild approached Marian last January, the final papers were not signed until June 14. Sister Norma Rocklage, acting-president at that time, commented on the negotiations, "We were going back and forth, back and forth, trying to decide. We were not sure if we could defer maintenance cost for the exterior work."

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

Marian landmarks razed

Two former landmarks on the Marian College campus were destroyed last month to create room for future building and for safety reasons. The Park School Gymnasium, old intramural gym, and the greenhouse behind Doyle Hall were razed by the Jordan Demolition Co, according to Don Fleming, Chief Financial Officer of Marian College.

The Executive Committee of the college decided to remove the structures upon the recommendation of five architecture firms that examined the buildings. Each firm reported that the cost of renovation would be extensive. The decision was also cleared with representatives from the Board of Trustees.

Built in 1917 as part of the Fischer Estate, the property of the gym was bought

in 1965 by Marian. It held the only indoor tennis courts in the state at the time of its construction. The clay for the courts was imported from Great Britain. Marian used the gym for intramural activities until about seven years ago.

After the asbestos was removed, the demolition of the building began the first week of August, according to Fleming. He also said the concrete balls and plaque over the entrance were saved from destruction to remain on campus.

When the ground has settled in the area, crushed rock will be placed over it to allow more parking space. Fleming estimated this process will be completed within a week. The site has also been designated

Asked why students who had signed up to live in Alverna were not informed, Sr. Norma responded, "They [St. Margaret's Guild] wanted to be the first to announce it. So we couldn't say anything about it." It was not until the end of May that the administration realized how few people would be living in Alverna.

By becoming involved in the project the administration sees Marian as doing its civic duty. The show case project will also enable people to get to know Marian College.

"We did talk with the Music Department before the decision was made. They were very cooperative and if we did not have a place for them to go this would not have happened," said Sr. Norma.

"We'll certainly be delighted with the renovations if they all go through," Sr. Ruth Ann Wirtz, chairperson of the Music Department said.

She went on to say that the Music Department at one time was in Alverna. St. Margaret's Guild will pay to store the

department's grand pianos. They will also rent upright pianos for the department to use in Alverna.

St. Margaret's Guild will open the redecorated Stokely Mansion May 18, 1990. Twenty to thirty thousand guests are expected to visit the mansion.

Letters to the editors must be turned in to the Carbon's mailbox in the faculty mail room by 12:00 noon, Monday, the week they are to run.


This fall Marian College, along with over 150 independent colleges will sponsor a program aimed at computerizing resumes of graduating seniors and alumni from independent colleges.

The computerized resume system will allow a corporate recruiter to have immediate access to primary information on all potential job candidates in the system. Forty-two criteria, such as major, grade point averages and work experience can be accessed to scan thousands of resumes to find those candidates who fit specific job requirements.

The resume system was developed and marketed by Resume'-Link, a company headquartered in Columbus, Ohio. The service is now available to the corpo-

rate community and independent colleges in six states, including Indiana. Rapid expansion will soon provide coverage to include a 10-state area.

Seniors graduating in December, May and August can have their resumes entered into this system by contacting the Career Services Office, room 001, Marian Hall.

Bechler, Boyle take fourth at invitational

The Marian College Cross Country team opened its 1989 season on the road at the nine-college IUPUI Fort Wayne Invitational. Each school submitted two-man teams selected from their overall team. Brad Bechler and Brian Boyle combined to win fourth place overall in the field of 50 teams. Aaron Graeb and Jason Bridwell took 14th place in the meet.

Coach David Roberts was pleased with the outcome of the race, but still has some unanswered questions about the team. Having lost Rich Young and Mark Hennis for this season, he is building his team up to fill their shoes in running positions.

Returning runners include Bechler, Scott Van Alst, and sophomores Boyle, Bridwell, Jim DeMein, Steve Sitzman, and Steve Bailey. Graeb is a freshman from New Castle Chrysler High School. He was an all-conference and all-regional runner and Roberts expects him to move into a varsity position early in his college career.

Roberts is concerned about Bechler rebounding from injuries but is confident that a quality team will run for Marian, "We have the ability to field a competitive team. A lot depends on our work ethic." Marian faces a competitive schedule including a trip to the National Catholic Championships in October at South Bend.

The Knights will begin regular season competition at Tri-State University Sept. 9.

Volleyball sets up season

Shelton coaches seasoned team




