#### **NEWS**

CARTER PRESS CONFERRENCE———In a press conference yesterday, President Carter touched on the issues of Iran, the economy, and discussed different aspects pertaining to his re-election campaign.

Carter stated that the recovery of the economy was going well, though the recession will be "up and down" over the next few months. He will not advocate a tax reduction, saying that a decrease would "feed inflation in the future." Referring to Reagan's attacks to the President's stand on this issue, Carter responded that he could not allow "election pressures" to "shake economic policies."

Speaking on Iran, Carter said he did not forsee an early resolution to the hostage crisis, and at the moment the decision is in the hands of Iran's parliament. "The United States is not going to apologize," Carter stated firmly, but added that he will continue to encourage Iran air its grievances in an international forum.

The President believes his campaign to be "moderate" saying, "I try to discuss the issues . . . I do not attack the integrity of my opponent." These comments were made after he allegedly insinuated that Reagan was running a campaign of racism and hatred. He said, on the contrary, that he admired Reagan for rejecting the endorsement he received from the Ku Klux Klan, but again challenged him to a one-on-one debate in the White House "or any other forum here in this nation."

Anastasio Somoza, former president of Nicaragua who vowed to "return and conque?" his country, was assassinated in an ambush Wednesday in Paraguay where he had been living in exile. News of his death was marked by "wild" celebrations in Nicaragua where government officials claimed the "freedom forces" of Paraguay attacked Somoza's car with a barrage of bullets and bazooka shells.

Somoza and his family's 40-year rule was supported by the U.S. up until 1979 in the last months of the Nicaraguan revolution when Carter refused Somoza military aid.

The Nicaraguan government has been holding a trial in his absence the "crimes of his regime," claiming his guilt in the death of 50,000 citzens and "multiple crimes against his opponent."

DECISION STANDS ON ABORTION——By a 5-4 vote last June, The Supreme Court upheld as constitutional a restriction on Medicaid spending for abortion excepting when a women's life would be endangered by childbirth or in cases of promptly reported rape or incest.

A third of those than one million abortions performed each year since 1973 have been paid with Medicaid. The ruling is expected to lower the number of Medicaid abortions to fewer than 2,000.

THE ITVIPORTANCE OF BEING POLITICAL

Last week Sister Rachel West commented on the alarmingly.

low participation of eligible voters in recent elections. The result of this apathy has been to enhance the already formidable influence of lobbyists in the service of "factions," as Madison called them in Federalist paper no. 10, with corresponding injury to the public good. Sister West went on to propose that students at the college register to vote and advised what might be done to inform themselves on the issues. It was good advice and I would like to expand on just why it was good advice.

The central question is: "Does politics really matter?" Perhaps nothing matters as much. Robert Drinan, S. J., presently a congressman from Massachusetts, in obedience to a Papal directive, is not standing for reelection. But he is not giving up politics; he is working for the election of his party's nominee in the district. As a congressman, Father Drinan was a civil rights and social justice advocate. For him "politics is the formation of public morality. "Just what one might expect from this tribe," you might say.

But others, non-priests, have agreed. The great conservative Edmund Burke said that "the principles of true politics are those of morality enlarged; and I neither now do, nor will ever admit of any other." Both Drinan and Burke may well have had in mind (certainly they read) Aristotle's discussion. For Aristotle the state is natural to man, not conventional, in that it is only as a member of an organized community that man's supreme good, the best possible moral and intellectual life, is possible. Wrote the philosopher, "He who . . . is without a State, is either above humanity or below it." One is sure that for Aristotle such a man fell "below it," to the level of the beast. From this it followed that politics is both the highest art and the most serious occupation.

Now all this business of Madison, Burke and Aristotle may well appear as one of those lofty, sonorisus sermons, complimentary to our amour propre but in "the real world" so much clap trap. That's just the problem. That it may seem naive and irrelevant is the measure of the demoralization of our political life. When we see politics as the serious business it is by nature, our nature, then we will have a politics worth taking pains with. It won't happen by continuing to keep aloof. Of course, it may never happen.

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U. S., CHINA SIGN PACT———Chinese Vice Premier Bo Yibo said China is committed to becoming a "highly democratic, civilized and modern to ton," after the signing of an agreement by both he and President Carter exhibiting the growth in China/U. S. relations.

The pact allows for commercial airline traffic between the two nations, raising the limits on imported Chinese textile products, a mutual opening of ports to merchant vessels and an increase of consulates.

The agreements were termed as the "completion of the normalization process" after 30 years of diplomatic isolation.

In the wake of different occur nees taking places in violation of respect to property the lest semester and early this semester, CARBON decided to chat with the head of the curity dept. at Marian Mr. Ron Schmoll to discuss the presence of unruly elements even when a force to combat it existed in campus.

Mr. Schmoll, how would you define the Marian Security system? Well, it's called the Continental Security System, they are here a little more than a year. personnel are responsible to check the lights, the boilers, direct traffic if we have any big function or any outside group having a function in our facilities. The Security is also responsible to ticket any parking violations and keep a watchful eye for any other violations or violators.

The present system replaced the earlier one not too long ago. What was wrong with the previous systems

It was our own system. We did not have enough personell to keep in uniform. And whenever a security person fails to show up, I myself had to do the lob. But with the present system, though expensive, we have a better service.

About two years back, cars parked at the 30th St. parking lot were vandalized. Did the Marian authorities make an effort to find out who the culprits were?

Sure, we called on the detectives and they did their Unfor tuanately they could not find any lead. But I think this type of occurence could be availed if the students themselves report any kind of new or suspicious faces to us or even page the Security personnel in the campus.

Last semester, valuables like cameras and the like were missing from the dorms, did the present system track down the wrongdoers?

themselves are the culprits, if any students suspects another student capable of doing arch a thing he/she should report it to the Controler or me and we will take action

A week ago, two cars parked in the 30th St. parking lot were again vandalized; doesn't this question the effeciency of the Security system Of notable interest to the Marian Community is Linda Leonard who at Marian?

We have called the police and they are trying to get some leads. In the mean time we have hired an extra security person; his job is to keep watch on the 30th St. parking lot; this is costing us \$300/week extra. In addition to this we have asked the city area police to do two rounds in the night.

What are the rules regarding parking violations?

Well, the first week there is a warning ticket. After that the first offence would cost you \$3 and there after \$5. But, if a person drives through the lawn, parking the fire lane, it 's \$5 right off the bat. However, if the person commits the same mistake more than three times, we tow the car away. This would cost the person about \$40 and \$3 per day additional for the no. of days you don't pick it up. The address is: Plough Wrecker Service

## INTERNATIONAL STUDENT PROFILE

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The 32 international students attending Marian College this fall semester represent 16 foreign nations. Both figures represent a small decrease from the fall 1979 international enrollment.

Only 11 of the students reside in the campus residence halls. Seven of the total are women, including one nun and two married persons.

Saudi Arai a has the largest number with eight students. Other multiple numbers include: Iran; 4, Columbia, 3; Venezuela, 3; Japan, 2. Single dents represent the nations of: Bahamas, Viet Uganda, Mexico, Kiwait, Sri Lanka, Nigeria, Italy, Jordan, and Lebanon. Also represented is the region of Palestine.

Four of the students are upper classmen, reflecting the high turnover of pre-engineering students in the group. Eighteen are listed as Freshmen, eight as sophomores, one junior and three seniors.

The 32 international students represent 6.4% of the full-time students enrolled at Marian College. Twenty-five of the total attended English Language Services (ELS) classes before

entering Marian.
