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There will be an all-college Mass on Ash Wednesday (class schedules are adjusted), to begin the Lenten Season. Lent is a time to take a good look at ourselves and how we relate to God and to others. It is a time for personal prayer, reflection, self-discipline and spiritual growth. As a sign of our need to do penance and have a change of heart toward God, the Church asks all Catholics who are over 21 years old to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday (eat only one full meal and 2 smaller meals); Catholics over 7 are asked to refrain from eating meat on the Fridays of Lent: A variety of opportunities for spiritual growth are offered in Lent:

Ash Wednesday 11:15 Mass and a ("fast for the Hungry of the World" see details elsewhere in the CARBON)

Daily Mass 7 a.m. and 11:30 in the college chapel on weekdays

Communion Service 4:15 on weekdays

Sacrament of Reconciliation every Sat. at 6 p.m. in chapel

Penance Service to be held in early April
