# Prepare resumes early

Why do you need a resume? Competition for desirable jobs has always been intense, but when jobs are scarce there is competition for all job openings. An effective resume can make the difference.

What makes a resume effective? Preparation. You must understand yourself, your career potentials and the current employment market. And you must realize that a resume is more than a fact sheet or inventory of your qualifications. It is your personal advertisement. It must sell as well as tell. What should a resume contain?

The chief function of a resume is to persuade an employer to grant you an interview. Thus your resume must interest an employer by telling him - Who you are, What kind of work can you do for him, and How you are qualified.

#### Contents of a Resume

- Identifying Information Your name, address and telephone number; possibly some of the items from your Personal Data. Job Objective
  - A statement indicating the type of work you are seeking; possibly mentioning your desired geographicallocation and salary.
- Experience or Work History A summary of your work experience emphasizing the most recent or most important job relevant to your stated Job Objective; describes the nature of your work, the title of your position, name of employer, dates and earnings.

Educational Background List of schools attended, dates, degrees, diplomas, and certificates with emphasis on highest level achieved and special training pertinent to your Job Objective. Military Record

A brief statement of your service obligations, if any, or your experience if your tour of duty is completed. Personal Data

An extension of the Identifying Information giving such vital statistics as age (if you think it is an asset), height, weight, marital status, number of children, early background (if it is significant), hobbies and other activities. Salary and Location

A brief statement of salary desired and location preference, if not included in Job

Objective. References

Usually you need only state that references will be supplied on request.

Date, Statement of Availability, and Photograph

These items are optional, but it is desirable to date each resume as you distribute it and to mention when you are available for work if you are leaving military service or graduating from school.

#### Format of Resume

The format of your resume is the combination of approach and the typographical layout which you select for presenting the facts about yourself. Your approach will naturally dictate the pattern of the typograghical layout and so your first decision will have to be where to place the emphasis in interpreting your qualifications.

Will you stress how you have spent your time? Or the kind of education you have had? Or the skills and abilities you have acquired? Or your personal potentials?

After your initial contact (either letter or interview) with prospective employers they will, if interested in you, usually request additional information. As a say of helping you put this information together and

This service is available upon request at the Student Services Office. When you come in you will recieve a Permanent Record form which will be retained on file to record where and when credentials were sent and your employment status. This form should be filled out while you are in the office. You will also recieve the College Interview Form and Student Evaluation three forms. The College Interview form should be completed by you and returned to the office. The Student Evaluation form should be given to the people you want to evaluate your abilities, knowledge, and per-sonal characteristics. They are to return these forms directly to the Office of Student Services.



# Stay in touch

Some people feel that prayer cannot be programed. It has to flow naturally like water from a cool spring. If prayer does not flow spontaneously from your heart, you had better not pray at all. Forced prayer is false prayer.

At first, this sounds convincing. But when you take a closer look at who man is and how he operates, you begin to see that this is a simplistic position.

There is no question that prayer sometimes comes unplanned from within. For example, some unexpected good news may send your spirits soaring. Or some disaster strikes, and you automatically turn to God. Or you suddenly become aware of God's hidden action in some event. When this happens you stand still -struck with awe and reverence.

The events of like can lead you to God. On the other hand, just the opposite can happen. Life can, at times, stand like a massive wall separating you from God. Problems or failures can so cloud your life that you ! gin to see nothing but gloom and darkness. The daying that "sorrow can so overwhelm and embitter you that you can't even stand the thought of God.

Even success and temporary happiness can obscure God from your consciousness. They can so take over your life that you are no longer aware of God. The realization of God's presence can so completely vanish from your life that you may go for months without thinking of him.

If you hope to build your life around spontaneous prayer only, you may soon find yourself not praying at all. You run the risk of being like an athlete who has tried to build his career on spontaneous enthusism, instead of training and practice. Such a career would be fanciful. It would be doomed to disaster before it ever got off the ground. The same is true of a person . who tried to build his spiritual life on spontaneous prayer only.

## BLACK SOUNDINGS by Curtis Goar, Jr., o.s.b. Not all niggers have dark skin

In my first article this term, I mentioned two types of racial cancer, benign and malignant. I wish to explain what I mean by benign racism in this article. When I think of it, a weekly comedy series comes to mind--Maude. She is an excellent example of the white liberal, or as I would say the "Niggerologist." This type of person has adopted the attitude that social justice for Blacks can be gained if we ignore all injustices and pretend they don't exist. They also "ignore" the fact that Blacks are really inferior and actually try to treat us as equals, much the way a weekend psychologist would treat a very retarded adolescent, motherly and pedentically. Their attitudes often verge on forcing the values of WASP America on Blacks, even though subconsciously they feel Blacks can't really appreciate them and the material things they bring. Despite these feelings, they know in their "hearts" that the Poor Black Man (or those "ebony lambs" as the Christian Niggerologist would have it) should be able to belong to a country club. Though not theirs, of course!

Fortunately for the world, there are white folks who are above this benign racism. They are the self-professed bigots and the white nigger, the bigot being one who does not mask his facism in the form of the "good white shepherd" but lets Blacks know where they stand, and, on the other hand, the white who has borne the burdens of de-

privation and social exile because of economic and cultural poverty and can, therefore, put himself in the place of the Blacks. He can, psychologically speaking, internalize the feelings and responses of Blacks in our society. He is not as Norman Cousins, editor of Saturday Review, in a recent editorial termed the white liberal, an ideological dilettante. The white nigger has felt the pressing thumb of society. Coming from poverty stricken rural areas or from urban slums, he has been cenied, by locale and heritage, the educational and social minimals.

So today I honor those folks who are constantly brought up at cocktail parties and colleges discussions, and I take my hat off to those whites who TBC\* in their own communities and do not come to wash the "ebony lambs" in the blood of white society. Blacks are well aware that whites will love us and love us to death. So to those whites who wish to join the struggle of liberation I give this charge: Stay out of the Black Community, stay home, change your mother and father, don't just adopt the cute little Black Baby, but have your relatives and friends hire the fathers. Work to change the present educational, social, and economic systems so that all men may share in the so-called American Dream, If not, America, like the world, will soon become a pile of junk without a junk man to clean it up. As You Like It

I saw the Monday night rehearsal of Sister Francisca Thompson's version of As You Like It and left with my feelings mixed and muddled. There has been a tendency on the part of directors in recent times to take Shakespearean drama and make it somehow more relevant and understandable for the contemporary audiences. This has been done quite successfully in the past by employing unique staging as was used in last year's presentation of Macbeth, or by changing the overall context of the characters as has been done with Julius Caesar, which has been handled as a gangster story.

As You Like It is a play with many subplots, themes, and subtitles. We are offered banished Dukes, estranged brothers, the forbidden love of Orlando and Rosalind, and the bawdy pastoral "romance" between Touchstone and Audrey, to name but a few elements which we must try to hold together. With this latest presentation of As You Like It comes a stumbling-block to

the enjoyment of the play. The characters have been, for the most part, costumed as caricatures of the ideas which they represent. In dealing with a play as complex as As You Like It, this attempt at originality falls short of its goal and hinders the continuity of the play. In respect to this problem, the actor's relationships with each other are strained and unnatural.

general presentation of the play are some good, and in some cases, superb individual efforts. Kevin Caraher, the world's most unlikely leading man, has absorbed the part of Orlando well and executes the role in a distinguished manner. 

VICE LORDS 13 A long-awaited

clash between the two top contending teams, both coming into action undefeated, finally made history Sunday in intramural football. Rolling over opponents with little difficulty brought the two tough teams together, each defending an unbeaten string. After nights of sleeplessness and nerves, both teams came onto the field highly keyed-up.

The opening kick-off went to the Vice Lord's finest running back. Dave Jongleux. Picking his way through scattered defensemen and using his blockers brilliantly, Dave headed outside and relied on his speed to reach the end zone. The extra point attempt failed on a deflected pass, leaving the Vice Lords on top 6-0 with only 2:59 gone on the clock.
