Marian College Basketball 1978-79
The 1978-79 version of the Marian Knights Basketball Team has already made one major improvement over last season, and is looking ahead for more. First, the Knights have already won more games, eight, then they did all of last year when they were 7-15. Secondly, they are looking for the first winning season since the 1973-74 season, and thirdly, they are looking for a possible district 21 play-off birth that hasn't been achieved since that same 1973-74. These last two goals, of third-year head coach John Grimes' Ball Club, appear to be very much within the grasps of the knights, especially after last Tuesday night's 86-79 win over the defending district champion Franklin Grizzlies, the first time the Knights have beaten them in the last seven games.

This year's version of the Knight Cagers may be one of the youngest ball-clubs in the district. With no Senior members on it's roster, 2 Juniors, 11 sophomores, and 6 fFreshmen, the Knight's have been at times, lacking in maturity and experience, that has shown up in four of their losses coming by a combined total of only éight points. It has not been uncommon to see a starting line-up of four 'or five sophomores throughout the course of the season, thus far. The two Juniors of the ball-club are $6^{\prime}-3^{\prime \prime}$ co-captain Rick Johnston, of Dillsboro, averaging 2.3 point/game, and $\overline{6}^{\prime \prime}-7^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{Jim}$ Brothers of Roachdale averaging 4.5 points/game. The Sophomores include 6'-7' Chad Miller of South Bend, currently the team's leading scorer with a 12.0 average, $6^{\prime}-4^{\prime \prime}$ George Chatman of Indianapolis, (11.1) who also leads the team in rebounds with 116 , Phil Sarvari of South Bend (11.1), who also leads the team in assists with 63, $5^{\prime}-11^{\prime \prime}$ Bryan Mills of Whiteland, (10.9) and who has averaged 18.2 points/ game over his last 6 games, $5^{\prime}-7^{\prime \prime}$ co-captain Dale Wernke of North Vernon, (4.3), who is also the team's leading free-throw shooter, shooting 79\%, $6^{\prime}-7^{\prime \prime}$ Ron Brothers of Roachdale, (3.6), 6'-5' Bren dan Mc Geehan of Noblesville, (5.3). and he leads the team in field goal percentage shooting $52 \%$, and $6^{\prime}-0^{\prime \prime}$ John Brinkley of ilndianapolis, with a 9.8 average.

Other players on the roster who are making a significant contribution to the Knights' success, as well as playing for second year coach Greg Deaton's Junior Varsity Team, are $5^{\prime}-8^{\prime \prime}$ Sophomore Tom Lewis of Dillsboro, averaging 4.9 for the JV Knights 6'2\% Freshman Gary Weber of BATESVILLE (15.7), $6^{\prime}-1^{\prime \prime \prime}$ Fresh man Alan Buck of New Ross (11.7), $6^{\prime}-2^{\prime \prime}$ Freshman Randy Lehman of Martinsville (10.8), $6^{\prime}-6^{\prime \prime}$ Freshman Tony Watson of Terre Haute (5.7), $6^{\prime}-4^{\prime \prime}$ Sophomore Mark Freije of Indianapolis, (8.4), $6^{\prime}-3^{\prime \prime}$ Freshman Dan Greenlee of Elkhart, (10.3), $6^{\prime}-3^{\prime \prime}$ Freshman Dale Keith of Rising Sun, (4.8), and $5^{\prime}-9^{\prime \prime}$ Sophmore Gene Franklin of Indianapolis, (5.5). All above averages are those of Junior-Varsity Competition. The Junior - Varsity Knights are currently 3-7.
The Knights are currently $8-8$, and have won four of their last five. They played up at Fort Wayne against Indiana Tech last night in search of climbing above the .500 mark for the first time since they were 2-1. They will be on the road for two games next week when they travel to Thomas More on Wed. (Jan. 31), and to Bethel, on Sat. Feb.3, for a very important District 21 Independent game. They will then return home on Tuesday night Feb. 6 when they host the Wabash Little Giants.
