Only 147 black students are enrolled at Marian. Only one full-time faculty member is black. No programs or activities are geared for minorities on campus. No classes are taught that deal with race relations or definitions of race. No blacks are involved with Student Board. Marian has only one black residence assistant. Only a handful of black students participate in sports.

What is wrong with this picture?

Over the next few weeks the Carbon will be investigating the same racial problems that most Marian students are ignorant of. These problems, whether a result of ignorance or intent, stab at the concept of Marian's "community-ness." How can "the college that cares" neglect part of its family? Although, by no means will the Carbon try to answer the deep-rooted problems of racial relations, it will attempt to probe the causes for Marian's neglect of black students.

ian College smoking policy went into effect. The policy states that is to be no smoking in college buildings except in faculty, staff offices or individual residence hall rooms. The smoking in these areas must be agreed upon by those present. Also included is a warning concerning excessive violations: "If an excessive number of violations occur, serious consideration will be given to implementing a 'no-smoking' policy in all areas of the campus." The policy is to be enforced by all staff, faculty, and students. Signs will be posted in all unauthorized areas of the campus and cigarette receptacles will be removed.

On Monday, October 22 there were several students smoking in the cafe at dinner. It is hard to believe that no one knew about the new policy, or that no one was bothered by the smoke. Still nothing was done. Throughout the week, there

smoke in the cafe; nothing was done. Even though the general consensus is that the new policy is a good one, people seem hesitant to act on it. Perhaps many did not know about the policy. There were not any new signs up and ashtrays were still available. Until we, the students, faculty, and staff, speak up and the administrators get signs up and remove ashtrays, the smoking policy will be meaningless.

Do not get the idea that the new policy is favored by everyone. One student when asked to comment on the policy said in a derogatory tone, "It's so...so Catholic." The second convocation of 1990-91 academic year has been set for October 30, 1990 at 12pm.

The guest speaker will be Father Lawrence Martin Jenco, OSM. His talk is entitled, "What the World Needs Now -New Hearts and Spirits." Father Jenco is a member of the Servite order (the servants of Mary) who dedicate themselves to foreign missionary service and parish work. The Joliet, Illinois native studied in Canada, Illinois, California, and Rome. Then spent two years in graduate study at Catholic University of America in Washington D.C. and later Loyola University in Chicago and Regis University in Denver. Some of his early assignments have been to serve as associate pastor in parishes in Colorado and New Mexico. In 1970, Father Jenco was elected prior of the Servite Community in Berkley, California. He has worked with the abongines in Australia, and also in India. In 1981, Father Jenco worked with Catholic Relief Services in the Yemen Arab Republic, also he worked with the Missionaries of Charity.

He was transferred to Bangkok in 1983 to be coordinator of pastoral ministry to help Indo-Chinese refugees. A year later, Father Jenco became director of the CRS program in Beirut.

In 1985 on January 8th, father Jenco was abducted by Shiited Moslem Extremist.

These students are to be commended for their commitment to the profession and for the very positive way in which they represented Marian College.




This is the seventh year that Marian students have been involved with the IAEYC conference. This year students were coordinated by Shari Robinson and myself.


