First of all, when one thinks of a convention sponsored by the Panthers, one automatically thinks of black people. However, I'd estimate that at least 80% of those who attended were white. This was when I realized that the Last Poets were right - "niggers are scared of revolution." If the Panthers don't have the support of their own people, their purpose has been defeated before they even start. I'm saying this particularly in reference to those persons at Howard who would not allow the convention to be held there. The convention, to say the least, was a failure. The lack of proper facilities, disorganization, and lack from the Black community were only a few of the reasons. The finale speech by Huey P. Newton was the only worthwhile portion of the conference. Other than the encouraging words spoken by Huey, nothing was accomplished. I hope that before the next conference, Black people wake up and stop being so interested in partying and bull-shitting so that some progress can be made towards freeing ourselves from oppression. If they don't, it may be too late.
