Admissions Recruit Students for SCOR

This seemed to have been a popular question Wednesday in Marian Hall. The Admissions Officers were located in front of the Marian Auditorium to answer questions about their SCOR program. Also a new eye catcher has been added to the recruitment program — slogan buttons. The buttons read, "Ask me about Marian." These buttons were given to anyone signing up for the SCOR program.

For those not informed as yet about SCOR, SCOR stands for Student Campaign on Recruitment. In this program, Marian students are asked to aid the Admissions Officers as Student Ambassadors in their recruitment of new students. Student Ambassadors can be tour guides and/or Big Brothers or Big Sisters.

At times during the year, Admissions Counselors visit area high schools taking along Student Ambassadors to answer questions pertaining to student life. There are two ways that Student Ambassadors can refer prospective students to the Admissions Office. First, one can simply forward the name and any information about the prospective student to the Admissions Office. The second method can also get parents involved. This simply entails cutting out articles from the student's hometown newspaper featuring achievements of outstanding students. Finally, during school breaks, Student Ambassadors are asked to contact prospective students in there hometown to inquire about their interest in Marian. Questions are also answered along with encouragement to visit campus by the Student Ambassadors.

If you are interested in the SCOR program and have not yet volunteered, it is not too late. All one has to do to become a Student Ambassador is contact the Admissions Office and let them know of your interest.

'Prime' Time for Theatre

"The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie" has been selected by the Marian College Theatre Department as its first production for the 1977-78 season. Written by Jay Presson Allen, adapted from the novel by Muriel Spark, the drama will be presented October 7, 8, and 9 at the Peine Arena Theatre.

The role of Miss Jean Brodie will be played by Ann M. Carr, supported by Laura Robinson, Gary Asher, Ann Hammond, Mary Hazel, Marcia Russell, Susan Close, Kathleen M. Donohoue, Philip Kern, and Mark Trierweiler.

Miss Jean Brodie is an eccentric school teacher at a girls' school in Edinburgh, circa 1931 to 1933. Miss Brodie is, indeed, a fascinating and formidable figure, molding young minds to her form. Although the girls admire her, Miss Brodie's conduct is not the most exemplary, and one of the girls turns against her. Although humorous and oftentimes pathetic, the play is especially perceptive in its merciless study of character.

When the play was performed on Broadway in 1969, Zoe Caldwell won the Tony Award as 'Best Actress' in the role of Miss Brodie, and shortly thereafter, when the film was produced, Maggie Smith won the coveted Academy Award as 'Best Actress' for the same role.
