New stadium is approved

The roar of saws cutting blacktop, brick walls and mature trees and the din of groaning cranes uprooting cement bases and tree stumps announced the commencement of work on the new baseball stadium at Marian College. College and amateur baseball are being given new footing at Marian College.

The new facility will be anchored by a 1700 square-foot, two-story building behind the current and future home plate. With a full view of the playing field, a 20-person press box will be perched atop a structure with restrooms, concession stands, a first aid station and some storage space. Seating for 1000 fans will flank the first and third base lines. A lit field with a new irrigation system, electric scoreboard, and a sound system will complete the basic project.

The construction marks the beginning of ties between Marian College and the Indianapolis Amateur Baseball Association (IABA). Approval has been obtained from both the Marian College Board of Trustees and the appropriate government agencies. In an April 19th letter to neighbors of the college, the Board of Trustees announced their approval of plans to proceed with the

Marian students win state office

At the Spring Conference of the Indiana Student Newman Association, sophomores Michelle Scheidt and Ray List were elected to serve as the state president and historian, respectively. The conference was held April 9 to 11 at the University of Southern Indiana.



"I try to be athletic," said Angela when she described her hobbies as tennis, golf, and aerobics. She enjoys tole painting and





Southwood will be working as a trainee in the department. His duties will include following up on complaints of job discrimination such as sexual or racial discrimination, assisting in research, and compiling statistical information.

The work schedule will be full-time summer employment, no employment during the fall semester, and part-time employment during the spring semester.

If all job requirements are completed satisfactorily, Southwood has the option of regaining full-time employment upon graduation from college.

The Marian College Career Planning and Placement Office contacted Southwood concerning the job opportunity. That office had received his name from the Sociology Department. He interviewed for the job and was selected out of the three Marian students applying. Southwood said "I am glad to have had the opportunity to apply for this job."

Finally, the IABA has agreed not to start any inning after 10:00 p.m.

Official groundbreaking will be April 28, before the game between Marian and the University of Indianapolis. The improvements begun this spring will be continued throughout the next three years. Upon the scheduled completion of the first phase early this summer, the new facility will be officially dedicated on June 9, at 6:00 p.m., preceding the IABA home opener.

Nine Marian College students joined nine Indianapolis business professionals in presenting a workshop at the Indianapolis ArchDiocesan Youth Conference held at Roncolli High School last Friday through Sunday.

The aim of the two-part workshop entitled "Are You Ready for the Future?" was to encourage the students to take an active role in the future, not to let the future just happen to them.

In the first hour, the 60 participants were divided up into nine groups, each lead by a Marian student. Next, they evaluated their goals in five years and discussed positive means in which to make these goals a reality.

Album review: Now and Zen

Every now and zen, I like to write an album review. What a better time than now? Robert Plant's newest release, Now and Zen, is easily the best album that has come out this year.

While on Plant's previous albums he has denied his Led Zeppelin days, on this album, he embraces them. Using guitarist Jimmy Page on two tracks of the album, Plant seems to have finally come to terms with his past. The lyrics to "Heaven Knows" seem to speak of Plant's regeneration: "A brand new human being razor sharp all firm and tan/ All clean, all pure with a 30 second attention span."

The best track on the album, "Tall Cool One" is reminiscent of Zeppelin, with Page on guitar and computerized samples of "Black Day," "Whole Lotta Love," "The Ocean," and "Custard Pie" at the song's conclusion. "Lighten up, baby" indeed.

"The Way I Feel" is a highly textured ballad that ends the first sight with reflective lyrics such as "The mirror tries to please me/ The

image wouldn't stay/ The stranger is too perfect/ To take my breath away."

The second side opens with the two awesome rocker "Helen of Troy" and "Billy's Revenge." The latter, especially, shows Plant's love for rockabilly.

The track "Why?" is laced with synthesizers that reminds one of the group Yaz. The final track, "While Clean and Neat" is excellently constructed with Plant's full vocal ranges exploited to their maximum potential. The song keeps sounding like it is almost ready to fall apart; but it never quite does. The lyrics "Beneath her skirts, between clean white sheets/ It's such a long way from the streets," have to be heard to be believed.

Well, Plant has put out another excellent album. It's just too bad that certain other, more popular, rock bands do not follow his example. I'll let you guess which one(s) I'm talking about.



The Knights baseball team, after a couple stumbles, appeared to be coming back to form as they handed Indiana Wesleyan (former Marion) a double defeat Tuesday evening. But the previous week was not all wins for the team, whose record now stands at 29 wins and 6 losses (8/3 in the conference).

After having handed I.U. South East a double defeat last Thursday (15/7; 9/7), Marian came up against conference leader Huntington on Saturday. In the end, Huntington squeaked out the double header 0/3 and 12/13 in a closely fought battle which seemed to rein the running Knights for the rest of the week.

Sunday saw an away set against Wabash, which the Knights split 13/9 and 9/21. The second game of the double header was ended on the ten-run rule (game ended because the difference in score is 10 runs) after the Knights lost their concentration. According to Coach Bret Shambaugh, "we were living in a tent and not playing good ball."

A new week dawned Tuesday, as the rested and refreshed Knights pounded Indiana Wesleyan (Marion) 13/3 and 10/1. Explaining that the team had previously played 14 games in nine days, Coach Lynn Morrell noted, "We play better fresh." Shambaugh added that the team needed to get "more businesslike," while players themselves agreed that they were again playing more cohesively as a team.

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
