

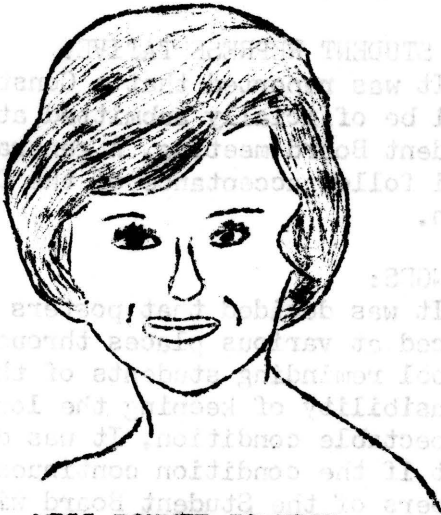

PUBLICATIONS BOARD

College publications have a dual responsibility: to the student readers and to the college as a whole. They should offer students a vehicle for self-expression, of opinion or of creative or critical endeavor. By their very nature they have a public relations function and a responsibility to promote higher learning as a way of life. They should also play a significant part in building campus morale, in unifying and interpreting the various departments of the college, personalities, and goals.

While the content necessarily varies with each type of publication, certain standards apply to all. These include the ethical canons of sincerity, truthfulness, accuracy, impartiality, and fair play, as well as the refinements dictated by good taste...

Editorials in particular should maintain the dignity consonant with Catholic ideals.

ADDED COMMENT ON CRITICISM

In an article which appeared in the CARBON on the thirteenth of December, Mr. J. Rettig delivered a criticism on criticism. He maintained that the element was "getting out of hand," and that this was exemplified by the Gadfly incident. Certainly, Mr. Rettig's article contained an element of truth, but he seemed to have neglected some important points.

First of all, I would be willing to give most students at Marian the benefit of credit when it comes to distinguishing constructive criticism. Surely, where we haven't the intelligence, we have the intuition. From discussions I have observed, most destructive criticism is recognized as such. When recognized, it is usually ignored.

Secondly, as Mr. Rettig would probably admit, without criticism, there is no progress. Without progress, both academic and social, how can we be proud of Marian College? In the very same issue of the CARBON, an article suggested the publicity medium. This is not really the answer. The answer lies, rather, in the attitudes of those in our college community, both students and faculty...

Although the Gadfly's method was questionable, this was more preferable than doing or saying nothing.
