The following is a description of the committees. If you are interested in being on one of these committees, put your name and the committee title on a sheet of paper and place it on the Student Board mail shelf located in the Student Services office.

Academic Affairs - This committee is concerned with cirriculum development, the improvement of instruction, and the general promotion of the academic goals of the college. Athletics Committee - Responsible for implenting athletic policy and reviewing/approving operation of the athletic program, including such items as eligibility standards, schedules, and budgets.

Financial Affairs - Consults with Controller on matters pertaining to the general fiscal welfare of the entire college community, and assist in formulating criteria for the estab-lishment of priorities among educational units in sharing the available resources.

Library Committee - Consults with the Librarian in establishing expansion policy in areas of cirricular studies, reference materials, and general interest material. Restance and admin Michannel and administration policy.

Program Committee - Plans, arranges, and administers a balanced program for cultural development of students, faculty, and when ffeasible, for the local community Student Affairs - responsible for all matters pertaining to

general student welfare, discipline, counseling, health, housing, and social activities.

Teacher Education - responsible for matters pertaining to and affecting teacher preparation; planning of teacher education curricular; standards for satisfactory completion of teacher cirriculam; advisor to registration and enrollment procedures. Non-Western Studies - concerned with the development and periodic review of non-west studies; coordination and promotion of departmental efforts in providing a balanced program; planning extracirricular activities related to the same objectives.

Judicial Panel - adjucate issues of student conduct in violation of college policy and sanction.

Conduct Appeal - provide final verdict if student appeals Judicial Panel's verdict. Traffic Appeals - appeals of parking and traffice tickets

incurred on MC campus.

Faculty-Staff Affairs - promotes faculty and personnel salary, and fringe benefits.; recommend tenure and promote professional growth.

LET'S MEET DAN

It' sthe beginning of the school year when things are busy and heavy at the offices at Marian. But Mr. Dan Stockwell our new R'.D. at Doyle Hall and to squeeze me in for a short informative interview. Dan Key Stockwell is from Reno, Nevada.

He graduated from the University of Denver with a major in Sociology and a minor in Psychology. During and after his studies Dan was preparing and training himself for a life dedicated to the service of young students. He was a member of the Alpha Tau Omega during his student days at the University and in 1974 was elected President of that Fraternity. In that capacity he had organized membership recruitment and orientation, facilitated leadership and gaol setting for fellow officers, and responsible for \$35,000 annual budget. He also was the Treasurer of the Interfraternity Council at the U of D.

During his sophomore, junior and senior years he did not let the summers pass by without fun. He was an orientation leader of the summer orientation and registra-tion programme at U of Denver. He was responsible for the initial orientation to university residence hall life, intro-duction to academic disciplines.. He also received a fellow-ship to attend a programme in professional development for Fraternity Advisors at IUPUI .. Order of Omega honored for Fraternity Advisors at IUPUI.. Order of Omega honored I.f. p.f.//? him for the outstanding contributions to the Fraternity System shy girls at the university.

Before joining the U of Denver Dan had had some experience as a Radio announcer over the KSRN radio Reno, Nevada and as a radio advertising salesman. After graduating Dan worked as a co-ordinator of Fraternity Affairs at Albion College where he was responsible for advising 6 college-owned Frat houses.. His administrative duties included fraternity related programming, planning, and coordinated routine maintanence, provided personal and academic counselling for fraternity members, and also advised and trained Interfraternity Council Judicial System. He was functioning in this capacity till he came to Marian. Mr. Stockwell seems to be well stocked for the job he has] undertaken at Marian.

When asked about his first impression of Marian, he answered " The people and students are very friendly. What do you think about the rules and regulation 3%? "Well at Denver we didnot have as many restrictions, there was 24 hr. visitation, alcohol was allowed." Do you think Marian should relax the rules? "No, the rules at Marian are very good. I think more schools should get back to strigt rules. At Marian you find the necessary ingredients for leadership. This is what most big schools are lacking today. Big institutions offer a great variety of courses but not the type of leadership that Marian does."

What do you think is the cause of this? (He paused for a while, lit his pipe, and puffed a few cloude of smoke which filled the room with a risk roasted tobacco aroma.) "Personally, yeh, I think I would get into ythe bandwagon with the majority and say it's the T.V." So you think mass media is having an adverse effect on the youth?
