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# The maggot saga continues



### Pell Grants shrink for 1989-90

(CPS) -- Students may find their Pell Grants will shrink after next June, the U.S. Department of Education warned last week.

The government, department spokeswoman Victoria Tripp said, is running short of the funds it uses to make Pell Grants.

Tripp said that campuses -- which are supposed to return unused Pell Grant money to the department, which then would give it to other students at other schools -- have not refunded as much money as the department had expected.

As a result, the government could try to balance its books by cutting the amounts it grants all but the very poorest students, borrowing money, or by asking Congress for a "supplemental appropriation."

Tripp said she didn't know how big the "shortfall" in Pell Grant funds would be-she guessed it would be \$30 million to \$50 million--but Charles Saunders of the American Council on Education (ACE)

in Washington, D.C., predicted it would amount to \$250 million.

Saunders feared the department would choose to compensate for the missing money by cutting everyone's grants a little, which the Reagan administration has threatened to do to both Pell Grants and Guaranteed Student Loans when shortfalls arose in 1987 and 1986.

Saunders wants the department to ask Congress for a supplemental appropriation instead of cutting grants.

He termed the department's choice "the first test of the Bush administration's support for education."

"It's not fair to automatically reduce students' awards. The department's estimates are always wrong, then if the estimate (of needed funds) is over the appropriation, they want to reduce the grants by that much."

Tripp said the department would make its decision about how to handle the shortfall in January.

#### Art museum sponsors seminar

Every two years the Indianapolis Art Museum sponsors a seminar in conjunction with the Coercion for Art Education through Butler, IUPUI, University of Indianapolis, and Marian College. 
"I enjoy having so many different speakers," Francis Kepes said. "For example,

## Council changes policies

College Council recently changed "withdraw passing/withdraw failing" (WP/WF) to a straight withdraw (W) and changed the last date to withdraw from a class to the Friday of the ninth week of classes. After that date, a student withdrawing from a class will receive an "F" grade. This does not include students who withdraw from school.

In an effort to accomplish as much work as possible to be included in the new college catalogue now being prepared, a number of other actions were taken regarding academic matters during the November, double session of council. Offerings and requirements were modified in the following programs: Art, Psychology, Music, Theatre/Speech, Radiologic Technology, Nursing, Computer Studies, English, Business Administration, Accounting, and Fashion Merchandising.

The numerical values assigned to the letter grades in the college catalogue were abolished because they are "obsolete, cause confusion, and restrict pedagogical freedom and creativity." The general education requirement of logic, mathematics, or computer science can now be met by CS 110.

Non-English speaking students must now score 550 or better on the TOEFL regardless of completion of level 109 at an ELS Center.

Specifics regarding departmental and other changes may be gleaned from the minutes of college council or the respective departments.


